Glen Alps

Now Professor Emeritus at the University of Washington School of Art, Glen Alps (BA-40) has not only been a teacher of art for more than 40 years, he has been an innovator in the field. He has developed new printmaking processes that have been adopted by artists throughout the world. He too is noted for calligraphy and burnt-lacquered plate prints, which are used extensively by artists throughout the United States, and he has designed and marketed a large intaglio printing press for use in printmaking. *6523 40th Avenue N.E., Seattle, Washington 98115.*

George Ayers

George "Fred" Ayers (MA-63, EdD-65) is a Senior Consultant with the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and former President of Chicago State University, an urban school with an enrollment of some 8,000. His University training in special education and counseling and education psychology were immediately put to work first as an instructor, and finally at a variety of administrative posts. Dr. Ayers also served as president of Massasoit Community College in Brockton, Massachusetts. Mildred Ballou

Mim Tesdahl Ballou (EdD-60), Professor Emerita at Ball State University, has been in the teaching profession since 1945, first as a classroom instructor in Iowa. Dr. Ballou served as professor of elementary education, chair of the department, and director of doctoral programs at Ball State. Through her activity in national and international associations, her numerous articles and books, and her many years of teaching those who will teach others, she has rekindled her passion for elementary science education in the hearts of thousands of students. *601 Brentwood Lane, Muncie, Indiana 47304.*

Alvin Barnhart

The period of 1960-70 was one of rapid growth at the University that required the construction of a new west campus. Dr. Alvin Barnhart (EdD-62) served as Vice-President for Administrative Services during that time and oversaw construction of nearly a dozen new buildings, creating facilities that can handle up to 14,000 students. Now retired, Dr. Barnhart has returned to Oregon. He began his career in Oregon schools, serving as an elementary school principal in Riddle from 1952 until 1961. Barnhart served as chairman of the Colorado Commission on Higher Education Committee on Educational Administration in 1986 and as President of the Western Association of College and University Business Officers in 1986-87. *Route 2, Box 2270, Bandon, Oregon 97411.*

Joseph Barrett

Helping those in the legal field understand medical anatomy has been a major accomplishment of Dr. Joseph Barrett (BA-68), an associate professor in the Department of Anatomy at the Medical College of Georgia. Dr. Barrett has authored a series of textbooks entitled *Medical Anatomy for Attorneys* and has conducted several seminars on the subject. Dr. Barrett also has conducted extensive research on the kidney. Edward Beaty

When he earned his doctorate, little did Edward Beaty (EdD-63) know that within a few years he would be called upon to lead the creation of a community college in Greeley. He was, as president, the first employee of Aims Community College where he was hired after serving as dean of instruction at Columbia Basin College in Pasco, Washington. At the time of his death at the age of 55, Aims board member Margaret Houtchens described Dr. Beaty as being "almost solely responsible for building the college to what it is today. He came in and looked at the old Lincoln School on the east side of town and said, 'We can start a college here just fine'." Aims today serves some 15,000 students. Dr. Edward Beaty, 1919-1975.

Robert Benton

He represents a distinguished career in education. Dr. Robert D. Benton (EdD-61) has served as Dean of the College of Education and Human Services at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh since 1987. Dr. Benton taught high school English and speech in Iowa, was Director of Public Information and Coordinator of Secondary Education in Rapid City, South Dakota, and became Assistant Superintendent there before taking the position of Superintendent of Schools in Council Bluffs, Iowa, in 1966. He was named Superintendent of the Iowa State Department of Public Instruction in 1972, and held that post until 1987 when he accepted his present position. 1731 White Swan Drive, Oshkosh, Wisconsin 54901.

Tilman Bishop

His contributions to education have come not only in the classroom and in administration, but on the political front as well. Tillie Bishop (BA-54, MA-55) has served in the Colorado legislature since 1970, first as a Representative and currently as State Senator serving the Mesa County area. During his legislative tenure he has continued his work as Director of Student Services at Mesa State College in Grand Junction. Bishop began his career teaching and coaching in LaSalle and Gilcrest. His contributions to Colorado have come in many areas, and he currently chairs the Colorado Tourism Board. 2697 G Road, Grand Junction, Colorado 81506.

Idris Boltz

A strong advocate for vocational education, "Ide" Boltz (MA-36) built a vocational program in Larimer County that culminated in the creation of the Larimer County Vocational Technical Center. Boltz was then serving as Superintendent of Schools in Fort Collins, and built the cooperative agreement with Loveland and Estes Park schools to create the Center. Boltz began his career as a teacher and coach after earning a bachelor's degree in 1929. After his retirement as Superintendent in Fort Collins in 1971, he served as Executive Director of the Colorado Federal Relations Commission for Education until 1982. The naming of Boltz Junior High School in Fort Collins reflects the respect the district held for him. Idris Boltz, 1905-1987.

Fritz Brennecke

In the volatile profession of college coaching, his 22-year tenure as head football coach at the Colorado School of Mines is remarkable. Fritz Brennecke (BA-36) not only earned his degree, but performed as an outstanding athlete at the University of Northern Colorado, which led to a career of coaching first at Golden and Denver South High Schools, then at Mines. His success at Mines earned him the title of Small College Coach of the Year in 1958, and he has been enshrined in the National Collegiate Athletic Directors' Hall of Fame and the Colorado High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame. Brennecke also served his community as mayor of Golden, and now writes a weekly column for the *Golden Transcript*, covering Mines sports. 2301 Illinois Street, Golden, Colorado 80401.

Clyde Brundy

He sold his first article to the *Briggsdale Banner* in 1920. His fingers have never left the typewriter since. Clyde Brundy has been writing for 70 years, with his articles appearing in such magazines as *Good Housekeeping*, *Western Farm Life*, and *Country Gentleman*. He has written extensively for newspapers including the *Kansas City Star*, and *Denver Post*. Brundy studied creative writing techniques while a University student in the late 1930s. His creativity has led to the publishing of *High Empire*, a novel of Greeley and Aspen in pioneer days that has sold nearly one million copies, as well as four other novels dealing with pioneer life. 17491 East Grand Avenue, Aurora, Colorado 80015.

Robert Bush

Robert Bush (BA-35, MA-37) learned from some of the top teacher trainers in the nation. Now he has gone on to become one of the top teacher trainers in the nation. Dr. Bush has worked with Stanford University throughout his career. He is currently Emeritus Professor of Education and Director of the Center for Educational Research. Dr. Bush's experience includes work that resulted in two major and now widely used research and training efforts, microteaching and flexible scheduling. Both individualize instructional programs in secondary schools. Lonis Butler

An honor that lives on every day at the University for Pete Butler (BA-31, MA-34) stands on the West Campus, Butler-Hancock Hall. The gymnasium is appropriately named in honor of Dr. Butler who retired as Dean of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation in 1973, and long-time coach John Hancock. Dr. Butler left his mark on the school as a student athlete, coach, and administrator. As head baseball coach, Dr. Butler's teams won the Rocky Mountain Conference championship each of his 25 years, and had six All-American players. He was head basketball coach for 15 years, and his teams won the conference championship seven times. *Pete Butler, 1909-1983.*

Rodger Bybee

Science education is important to Rodger Bybee (BA-66, MA-69). His college teaching career included the University of Northern Colorado, New York University, and for 12 years Carlton College, where he chaired the Department of Education. Dr. Bybee is a nationally known consultant, working on such projects as National Science Foundation grants to study the status of biology education and the National Assessment of Educational Progress. Today Dr. Bybee is focusing on improving the way biological sciences are taught in the classroom. Dr. Bybee serves as Associate Director of the Biological Science Curriculum Study, a national curriculum development corporation based in Colorado Springs. *P.O. Box 237, Cascade, Colorado 80809.*

George Carlson

He built a "law and order" reputation that led him to the governorship of Colorado in 1914. George Carlson (PedB-1898) turned to politics after a brief private law career and was elected District Attorney for the Eighth Judicial District in 1908. Carlson was a prosecuting attorney against militant striking miners in the state, including those involved in the famous Ludlow Massacre. He used that exposure to gain the Republican nomination for governor in 1914. As governor his main interest centered on the prohibition movement and he signed the state law providing for abolition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicants in 1916. He lost a bid for re-election. *George Carlson, 1876-1926.*

Gordon Cawelti

Leadership is what Dr. Gordon Cawelti (MA-54) brought to the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development in Alexandria, Virginia. Dr. Cawelti took the reins of the Association in 1971 and boosted membership from 12,000 to 126,000, while creating the National Curriculum Study Institutes program and establishing international affiliates. Dr. Cawelti is known for his writing on leadership and curriculum and has provided training for international school leaders. He was Superintendent of Schools in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and before that, served with the North Central Accrediting Association in Chicago, where he helped initiate the school evaluation program still employed by all member schools. *6048 Redwood Lane, Alexandria, Virginia 22310.*

Ying-Hau Chen

He spent 20 years as a school teacher and administrator in Taiwan, gaining experience that serves as a basis for his leadership today at the Provincial Tainan Teachers College. Dr. Ying-Hau Chen (MA-73, EdD-75) had already spent two decades teaching when he came to Greeley to earn his graduate degrees. After he returned to Taiwan, he was appointed Associate Professor and Chairman of the Department of Education at the National Kaohsiung Teachers College. He was made Dean of Student Affairs in 1982, and in 1984 moved to the Provincial Tainan Junior Teachers College as president. In 1987 Dr. Chen was named president of the Provincial Tainan Teacher's College. *12LN 35 SEC 2 SHO-LIN, Tainan, Taiwan, Republic of China.*

Sandra Cole

Eight state championships, 11 district championships; it is hard to say more about the quality of coaching from Sandra Weigandt Cole (BA-67, MA-70). But there is more to tell about the volleyball coach at Platte Valley High School. It is her philosophy of teaching that is so important. Sandy Cole wants to teach sport and fitness skills and activities that enable students to remain participants for a lifetime. She demands hard work, dedication and self-discipline that pays off in the lives of her students. Ms. Cole has served as head volleyball coach for 17 years, and has coached other sports as well during that time. She was instrumental in developing the girl's athletic program at Platte Valley High School. *2539 15th Avenue, Greeley, Colorado 80631.*

William Creswell, Jr.

Student health may just be a little bit better today, thanks to the work of Dr. William Creswell, Jr (BA-48). He has become one of the nation's top researchers into adolescent health behavior, working on projects aimed at better understanding the health habits of youngsters, including drug-use and smoking. He was also a member of a project team that developed a school health education curriculum for use across the country. Dr. Creswell serves as Professor of Health Education at the University of Illinois. Before joining Illinois in 1962 he was Assistant Executive Secretary for Health Education with the American Association for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation. *1501 West William Street, Champaign, Illinois 61821.*

Barbara Davis

The fruits of her talent have appeared many places, and there is no doubt you have seen some of the costuming created by Barbara Davis (BA-74), who began her career as an associate draper for the Santa Fe Opera, and moved to the Metropolitan Opera in New York. Her talents next appeared on television and in motion pictures as she worked for eight years as costume consultant, executive draper, puppet builder and wardrobe stylist for Jim Henson Associates. Her work was used in the "Muppet Show" and the "Jim Henson Hour" on television and in such movies as "The Muppets Take Manhattan." William Davis

Dr. Bud Davis (MA-58) is the Chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agriculture and Mechanical College, a comprehensive land and sea-grant research university with an enrollment of 26,000 students. Early in his career, he taught high school English and coached football and track. Before his recent appointment, he was a Distinguished Service Professor at Oregon State University. He also served as Chancellor of the Oregon State System of Higher Education and as president at both the University of New Mexico and Idaho State University. *Office of the Chancellor, Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, Louisiana 70803-3101.*

Harold DeBey

He knew what higher education should be. Harold DeBey (BA-47) was a scientist and educator; in fact he was an authority on amino acids, but his goal was the coherent integration of knowledge at the undergraduate level. After his studies for a doctorate, he spent the remainder of his life teaching at San Jose State University. Dr. DeBey was a chemistry professor, but his pride and joy was the New College, created at San Jose State during the turbulent 1960s. He deplored the separation of the humanities, arts, social sciences, and sciences from one another and worked to bring them together, while serving as provost of New College for eight years. *Dr. Harold DeBey, 1924-1988.*

Marie Diggs

Marie Hicks Diggs (AB-40, MA-47) has become a by-word in guidance and counseling in Kansas, but the road to that reputation was not an easy one. Mrs. Diggs worked her way through both high school and the University selling encyclopedias door-to-door with her mother. Before she finished her degree program, she was married and taught as a team with her husband, Charles, in Nebraska and Kansas. After his death, although she had two children, she journeyed to Greeley to complete her degree. Her reputation gained her the newly created position in charge of guidance and counseling at the Coffeyville (Kansas) Junior College; and finally president of the Board of Trustees. She also served as Dean of Women. *Fairacres Manor, Greeley, Colorado 80631.*

Maggie Divelbiss

After teaching 20 years, Maggie Divelbiss (BA-53) took on the arts. In 1974, she started her new career, promoting the arts at the Sangre de Cristo Arts and Conference Center. Under her guidance, this performing and visual arts center that serves all of southern Colorado was awarded the prestigious Francis King Collection of Western Art. Today Ms. Divelbiss is director of the Center, which is in a new facility. In addition, she is general manager of the Broadway Theatre League of Pueblo, and is a gubernatorial appointee to the Colorado Council on the Arts and Humanities. She also has served as consultant for the National Endowment for the Arts. *229 Midnight, Pueblo, Colorado 81005.*

Thomas Doherty

You only have to drive down Barnes Road in Colorado Springs to see what the people of that community think of Tom Doherty (BA-38, MA-42). Doherty High School is named for the long-time administrator of School District 11. He used his University training for a career of administrative work in Colorado Springs where he started as a principal. In 1950 he was named Assistant Superintendent of Schools, and served as Superintendent from 1964 to 1977 during a rapid expansion of enrollment and physical plant. Doherty's leadership met the challenge, shaping District 11 into one of the state's top school districts with five high schools today. *2443 Marlborough Road, Colorado Springs, Colorado 80909.*

Frances Dougherty

During her 40-year teaching career, M. Frances Dougherty (BS-35, MA-40) had the privilege of teaching at every educational level. She taught in the Denver Public Schools before returning to Colorado State College as an associate professor of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. After earning her doctorate, she went on to head the Department of Dance at the University of Oregon, where Dr. Dougherty is now a Professor Emerita. She served as President of the American Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance. She is a former editor of *Western Society for Physical Education College Women*. *529 W. Lawrence Eicher

This man believes in international standardization as an investment based on his confidence in the rational application of technology for the benefit of all. After earning his doctorate, Dr. Lawrence Eicher (BA-60) moved from teaching to become program manager for the National Science Foundation, then Director of Engineering Standards for the National Bureau of Standards. In 1980 Eicher took his efforts to the international level by becoming first Assistant Secretary-General, then Secretary-General of the International Organization for Standardization in Geneva. The ISO seeks to solve international standardization problems, with new ones continually appearing due to the rapid advance of technology. *Joli Cret C, 1261 Cheserex, Switzerland.*

Ed Elliott

A 14-year career in administrative positions at Wayne State College, including the presidency, aptly prepared Ed M. Elliott (EdD-69) for a career as President of Central Missouri State University. He was honored with the Distinguished Service Award at Wayne State for his work to improve the Nebraska institution. Active off campus as well, Dr. Elliott serves in community service clubs and in national professional organizations. *518 South Holden Street, Warrensburg, Missouri 64093.*

Hollis Fait

His development of physical education programs for handicapped students pioneered the field. Dr. Hollis Fait (BA-46, MA-47) wrote nine books and co-authored 16 others during his long career that ended at the University of Connecticut where he served as Coordinator of Special Physical Education. He served as co-editor of the Saunders Physical Activities Series and was a member of the editorial board of the Connecticut State Department of Education. His work with handicapped students was so important he was honored by the American Association of Physical Education, Health and Recreation during the Association's centennial as one of the century's outstanding educators. *Dr. Hollis Fait, 1918-1984.*

Dean Fleischauer

While many Colorado school districts have faced population increases or declines, the Superintendent of Schools in the Fountain-Fort Carson District has had to face the challenge of providing a meaningful educational experience for a very mobile student population. Dean Fleischauer (EdD-67) provided that quality education in a district where the constant transfers on an army base require flexibility and a wide variety of programs. His work made him a national leader on issues facing federally-impacted school districts. Before his retirement in 1986, Dr. Fleischauer was a long-time administrator. Before serving in Fountain, he was Superintendent of Schools in Odell, Nebraska and in Akron, Colorado. *609 Kiowa Avenue, Fountain, Colorado 80817.*

William Force

He grew up in Greeley and went to grade school and high school here, so it was only natural William Force (BA-38) would earn his bachelor's degree here. Dr. Force has mixed business, teaching and educational administration into a long career that concluded in 1981 at Vanderbilt University in Nashville. He worked extensively to coordinate and merge higher education facilities at Vanderbilt, Peabody College, Fisk University, Meharry Medical College and Searritt College. Leslie Franklin

The success of Leslie Franklin (BA-62) spills over from his professional career to giving of himself for his community. A long-time executive of the IBM Corporation, Franklin was instrumental in founding the Colorado Black Roundtable, an organization established to effect positive changes in the black community, including economic development, education, housing, and health and human services. He sits on numerous boards, including the Governor's Latin-American Task Force, the Mayor's Black Advisory Council, the Colorado Literary Council, and the Urban League of Metro Denver. Franklin was appointed in 1987 by Governor Roy Romer to direct the Governor's Job Training Office, and serves as an executive on loan. *8101 East Dartmouth, No.11, Denver, Colorado 80231.*

Ralph Frazier

Only a few educators are fortunate enough to build a program literally from the ground up. As the Chairperson of the Division of Science and Mathematics at Southwest State University in Marshall, Minnesota in 1967, Ralph Frazier (BA-39, MA-41) was charged with the responsibility of developing and implementing a complete undergraduate curriculum in the sciences and mathematics. He hired the faculty and assisted in the planning of the curriculum and physical facilities at the new school. He accomplished all of this in a five-year period, while at the same time providing a quality education to the students taking his classes. *1108 Robertson, Fort Collins, Colorado 80524.*

Ervin French

The career of Ervin French (BA-42, MA-46) is entwined with the success of one of Colorado's most respected junior colleges, Northeastern in Sterling, where he earned the title President Emeritus. The college began as an extension of the public school system, but by 1953 the College Committee decided to make the school independent, and French, who was serving as administrative dean, was named president. His contributions extended beyond the campus, and he served as President of the Empire Junior College Conference and of the Colorado Association of Junior College Administrators. He also served the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools in several capacities. *20406 Autumn Court, Sun City West, Arizona 85375.*

Donald Garrity

This man has devoted his life to education, both in the classroom and as an administrator. Donald Garrity (BA-50) was an instructor at the University of Washington before moving to San Francisco State University. During his 22-year career at San Francisco State, Dr. Garrity advanced professionally. He began as a professor of sociology, chaired the department for six years and served as provost for 15 years. Dr. Garrity is presently the president of Central Washington University. He is also widely published and has edited academic journals, and serves in many professional associations. *211 E. 10th, Ellensburg, Washington 98926.*

Lloyd Gaskill

Although he is retired, his name lives on in Colorado high school coaching history. Lloyd Gaskill (BA-35) took his Limon Badgers to 10 state championships (a state record) in football, gained runner-up status four years, and posted undefeated seasons eight times. Gaskill's overall coaching record was 236-58-8. It is no wonder Gaskill was named to the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame in 1981. Most significant though is the fact that Gaskill has guided hundreds of boys into adulthood through his athletic program. Gaskill, by the way, was a member of the "Eleven Iron Men" that led the State Teachers College to a 13-7 football victory over the University of Colorado in their last meeting. *750 9th Street, Limon, Colorado 80828.*

Samuel Gates

The administrative skills of Sam Gates (BA-45, MA-47) were put to work coordinating Colorado's state college system; he served as Executive Director of the Trustees of State Colleges in Colorado for most of the 1970s. Gates took the position after serving as Associate Director of Wisconsin State Universities and President of Wisconsin State University at La Crosse. Before that, Dr. Gates completed his education, which had been interrupted by his service in World War II; went on to complete his doctorate, and returned to Greeley to serve as Director of the Laboratory School and Dean of the Graduate Division. 320 Riverside Drive, Estes Park, Colorado 80517.

Bill Gearheart

His textbooks have been used in more than 300 colleges and universities in the U.S. and in foreign countries. Now an insurance executive, Bill Gearheart (EdD-63) continues writing about special education; with his wife Carol, a University of Northern Colorado professor, he is writing a new textbook to be published in 1990. Gearheart served as Assistant Superintendent of Schools in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, before joining the faculty of the University in 1966. He was Director of the UNC Navajo Project, which provided educational service to handicapped and gifted Navajo children and he served as consultant to many state and federal agencies, and to foreign governments. 2209 20th Street Road, Greeley, Colorado 80631.

Robert Gilchrist

An educator for more than 60 years, Robert Gilchrist (BA-27, MA-28) began his career as a teacher in Colorado and Missouri. He chose administration as a career path and he served as a principal or assistant superintendent of schools in several states before becoming Superintendent of Schools in University City, Missouri. He became professor at Ohio State and then at U.S. International University in San Diego. He also was Superintendent of Schools in Palo Alto. Dr. Gilchrist was president of the Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development and director of the U.S. Regional Educational Laboratory. Donn Gresso

His skills as a school administrator have put Donn Gresso (MA-66) at the top of his profession. As vice-president of the Danforth Foundation, Dr. Gresso has served as Director of the Danforth Program for School Principals, and the Director of the Danforth School Administration Fellowship Program. He also has been called upon by the federal courts for work in monitoring desegregation, and has held a federal appointment to study excellence in the schools. Mildred Hansen

Her career helped shape a community for 24 years. Mildred Hanson (BA-27) was publisher of the *Greeley Tribune* and viewed her newspaper as not only a business, but as a vehicle to improve her community. Her journalism career began as a proofreader and office helper at the *Tribune*, owned by her uncle. She became owner and publisher of the paper in 1953 and held that post until she sold the publication in 1977. This businesswoman found time for many charitable causes, including the Salvation Army Board and the Hospital Board. Fred Harcleroad

When you think of leaders in higher education, the name of Fred Harcleroad (BA-39, MA-42) comes right to mind. Harcleroad served as president of California State University, Hayward, and also as president of the American College Testing Program. He is a member of the Higher Education Colloquium, a group limited to 50 persons in higher education. Hewett drafted legislation for the preservation of American antiquities and the establishment of national monuments, and made the archaeological survey for the creation of Mesa Verde National Park. E'Rena Hockenberry

Her career was music to the ears of thousands of Jefferson County schoolchildren for a quarter century. E'Rena Hatch Hockenberry (BA-46, MA-74) spent a lifetime doing what she loved, teaching music. She did it well. Named Jefferson County Teacher of the Year in 1968, she also was inducted into the Colorado Music Educators Hall of Fame. Norman Howe

In the field of special education, few have had the impact of Dr. Norman Howe (EdD-71). As Director of the Personnel Preparation Division of the United States Department of Education, Dr. Howe oversees and coordinates the federal funding resources for all special education personnel training activities nationwide. Dr. Howe served as the program coordinator at the Council for Exceptional Children in Reston, Virginia. Kun-Huei Huang

Taiwan has benefitted from Dr. Kun-Huei Huang's (EdD-71) dedication to its education system and government. Monfort taught school in Weldona and Sterling, served in World War I, then farmed the family's 80 acres north of Greeley, and in 1930 turned it into what was then a revolutionary idea in agriculture, the feedlot. By the 1970's more than 200,000 head of cattle were being handled at Monfort lots. Ekavidya Nathalang

Government and educational leadership in his homeland has been the mark of Ekavidya Nathalang (MA-56) since his return to Thailand. In recognition, the King of Thailand decorated him Knight Grand Cordon (Special Class) of the Most Exalted Order of the White Elephant. A prominent member of the University faculty, Dr. George Sage (BA-55, MA-57) has been a professor of kinesiology and sociology since 1963. Sage's talents were recognized in 1987 with the M. Lucile Harrison Award for Outstanding Teacher of the Year. Sage was the 1978 UNC Distinguished Scholar, and was selected in 1985 as the Alliance Scholar for the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance.
