



Bridger Menlove '23

Greeley local Bridger Menlove '23 has strived to give back to his community since he enrolled at UNC. Menlove started at Utah State University before transferring to UNC to be with his now wife, Mikayla Menlove '21. At UNC, while he tutored in chemistry, he realized how much he enjoyed teaching.

During his time here, Menlove spearheaded efforts to revive Upward Bound, a college preparatory program for first-generation college-bound high school students. Through that program, Menlove taught science to low-income students, equipping them to succeed in science degrees and careers.

Menlove received the John and Anne Frey Scholarship, which enabled him to spend more time serving the community and, in the laboratory, preparing for graduate school. Currently, he is pursuing a doctorate in Neuroscience online through Florida State University. He plans to continue using his education and experience with UNC's Upward Bound program to fuel his passion for preparing underserved youth in the Greeley community for success in post-secondary education.






Lupita Nabor '23

Having grown up in Greeley with roots in Jalisco, Mexico, Lupita Nabor '23 is a writer, researcher, and now a published co-author and mentor who aspires to help others by focusing on issues of health inequities, identity, immigration and more. While attending UNC, Nabor tutored middle and high school students through a college readiness program for first-generation students like herself in higher education called AVID.

Nabor chose to attend UNC because of the support and opportunities offered for scholarly engagement and community-building opportunities. Many universities did not have an answer for how they support students protected by DACA, also known as Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals, so while at UNC, Nabor became involved on-campus with the DREAMer Program, serving as one of the student coordinators for undocumented student services by her junior year.



Through scholarships such as the Marcia Morrison Wilcoxon Scholarship, Nabor achieved things she never thought possible. Investment Performance

The mission of the University of Northern Colorado Foundation is to steward donations and provide support to UNC. An important element of this mission is investment management, through which support to the University is augmented and ensured for future years. Operating as a fiduciary, the Foundation seeks to both grow and protect funds over the long term. This past year, with an overall recovery in equity markets and a diminished decline in bond markets, the Foundation's long-term focused investment pool generated a net gain of 10.9% for fiscal year 2023.
