Section I: Degree/Program Requirements

A. Institutional graduation requirements for this degree program.

The graduation requirement for a transfer student pursuing Criminal Justice will be no different than the graduation requirements for a native student, including the minimum number of semester hours required for graduation requirements. Specifically, the student must complete the following requirements:

- Complete at least 120 credit hours and
- Successfully complete the required 45 credit hours in the major with a grade of 'C' or above (C- is non acceptable) and
- Students must provide a written rationale for their selection of elective courses for content (6 hrs) and skills (9 hrs) and receive written approval from their advisors for the courses. Modifications to the selection are permissible but must be documented. All written rationales and approvals will be held in the student's file in the Criminal Justice program office and
- Earn at least a 2.00 GPA in courses completed at UNC.

Section II: Transfer of Credit

- A. Grade Eligibility.
Only academic courses with a letter grade of C or better are transferable. The four-year institution will accept and count toward meeting graduation requirements all state guaranteed general education courses that have a grade of C or better.
- B. UNC accepts some scores of 3 and accepts scores of 4 and above on Advanced Placement tests and scores of 4 and above earned on International Baccalaureate tests.

- C. UNC will accept all approved credits earned with ten years of transfer. Courses earned more than ten years earlier may be evaluated on an individual basis.
- D. UNC may apply state guaranteed general education (gtP) courses toward the major or other graduation requirements if that facilitates the student's graduation more effectively.

Section III: Appeal Process

- A. Institutional Appeal Process
Students who follow this agreement shall have the right to appeal a transfer decision that appears to be inconsistent with the terms and courses listed in this agreement. Appeals pertaining to this 2008-2009 Transfer Guide should be filed with the institution. A student
