WHY STUDY SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGY AT UNC?

The School Psychology (Ed.S.) program is housed within the School of Applied Psychology & Counselor Education at the Extended Studies Denver Center at Lowry. Successful completion of the program leads to the Educational Specialist degree (Ed.S.).

The aim of the program is to develop professionals who are able to apply psychological and educational principles to improve the psychosocial environments of children (ages birth-21) and their families. Attention is directed toward the development of skills in planning and implementing direct academic and social/emotional interventions with a focus on evidence-based and culturally sensitive practice; and providing individual and systems consultation within schools and the larger community. These skills are further enhanced with knowledge, practice and expertise in the areas of intellectual and emotional assessment and cognitive and social development of children.

Students who successfully complete the Education Specialist degree are eligible for state licensure and national certification. The Extended Studies program in Denver is located on the Lowry Campus of the Colorado Community College System. Evening and weekend classes meet the needs of adult learners and working professionals who have jobs, families, and other responsibilities. You study side-by-side with other professionals who share ideas, successes and problems related to challenges you face every day. Advising and instruction is offered on campus by an academic advisor and program faculty. For added convenience, distance technology is utilized as needed.

WHAT DOES THIS PROGRAM PREPARE ME TO DO?

- Consult with teachers, parents, administrators and other professional service providers
- Plan and implement direct interventions, as well as curriculum and environmental modification
- Assess the intellectual, emotional and social development of children
- Evaluate programs and conduct field-based research

ARE CLASSES CONVENIENT FOR ME?

This program is designed for adult learners who are working professionals, thus instruction is offered during convenient weekend hours. To facilitate communications with faculty, program support staff and other students in your cohort, it is necessary to have access to a computer (*preferably a laptop*), email, and the Internet. Computer training is provided as part of the program and is included in APCE 670. We encourage you to bring the laptop to class to view handouts and assigned readings.

Some courses during the second year of studying require that you spend 180 hours working under the supervision of a school psychologist. This translates to one day per week during the semester.

Examination

HOW AND WHEN CAN I APPLY?

You must possess a baccalaureate degree from an accredited college or university and be accepted by the UNC Graduate School. Admission to the graduate program in school psychology is a two stage process consisting of: 1) preliminary screening by the Graduate School; and 2) final review by the school psychology faculty. GRE scores required: 1000 or better for Verbal and Math with no less than 450 on each section; minimum score of 3.5 for Writing Assignment.

New student cohorts typically begin in the spring or summer term. Please contact the Extended Studies Denver Center for information on the application timeline.

Submit to the Graduate School:

1. Completed application for admission.
2. \$50 admission processing fee.
3. Academic transcripts (two official copies) from each college or university you have attended (except UNC). A grade point average of at least 3.3 in the most recent 100 hours of academic work is preferred.
4. GRE score report.

When the Graduate School has determined that minimum university requirements have been met, your materials will be forwarded to the program area for consideration.

Submit to UNC’s Extended Studies Denver Center:

1. The Notice of Intent form (enclosed).
2. Your written statement (300-500 words) indicating your “Personal and Professional Reasons for Selecting School Psychology as a Profession.” Address this statement to the school psychology program coordinator.
3. Your vitae or resume.
4. Three letters of recommendation addressing both your ability to successfully complete the respective graduate program and the probability of your functioning effectively in the field.

Participate in an interview with Program Faculty: Selected program candidates will be invited for an interview with program faculty in Denver.
