Sarah Griess, Ph.D. graduated in 2010 and became a licensed psychologist in September 2011. "I did a full year post-doc at Colorado University at Boulder Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS- which is their student counseling center)," said Sarah. Sarah's findings from her dissertation will be presented at this year's APA Annual Convention. Sarah works at the UNC Counseling Center and will start teaching as an adjunct for the CP department. In addition to a professionally productive year, Sarah and her husband had a baby boy.

Michael LeBlond, Ph.D. is the first graduate from the CP program (2010) entering with a BA (also had a MBA). "Given that I had no family distractions or part-time job requirements, and coming from Silicon Valley, CA experience where the typical work week is 70-80 hours, I

was fortunate to complete the program in 4 1/2 years." He returned to school after retiring from a career in the High Technology industry. "I asked myself if I believed in retirement. The answer was a resounding NO! So, I resurrected a high school dream to 'someday' be a psychologist," said Michael. He is currently working for Arapahoe/Douglas Mental Health Network as a therapist in their Mental Health Court division. Arapahoe/Douglas was the first organization in the state to start a Mental Health Court. More are emerging now. Michael said, "Our mission is to pull individuals who have an Axis I diagnosis, criminal record, and substance abuse from the jails and prisons. A very challenging and wonderful population."

Chris Woodson, Ph.D. graduated from the CP program in 2010 and is now serving as the first psychologist in history to deploy to a combat zone with the 82nd Combat Aviation Brigade. He is currently serving in Eastern Afghanistan, based out of Bagram Airfield. He is responsible for providing psychological care for over 3,000 Troopers. He acts as a consultant to command groups and is a trainer to the psych techs assigned to him. He anticipates being in Afghanistan from September 2011 to September 2012, after which he will return to Ft. Bragg, North Carolina to continue his service in the US Army. Chris is a licensed psychologist and got his LP in November 2010. Congratulations to Chris for getting his dissertation published. Chris and his wife are expecting their fourth boy!

Yan Li, Psy.D. was born and raised in China. She came to the US for graduate school in 2002,

stayed in MO for 2 years for her master's degree in counseling, and completed her Doctoral degree in Counseling Psychology at the University of Northern Colorado in 2008. "I am currently working at the Counseling and Psychological Services at Duke University as a licensed psychologist providing clinical services to Duke students, as well as training graduate students in counseling. I am also clinical faculty at Duke Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences, Duke University School of Medicine. I am a certified yoga teacher. INTERNATIONAL CONNECTIONS

International Connections by CP Faculty

Dr. O'Halloran

In early September 2011, I travelled to Thailand to present several workshops on eating disorders. One multiday workshop at the International School of Bangkok (ISB) was entitled 'Identifying and Addressing Eating disorders within International School Communities'. The other workshop, presented at Assumption University in Bangkok, was entitled "Treatment Planning for Eating Disorders in Adolescents and Adults: Structuring Effective Outpatient Treatment." This was developed for psychologists and counselors in private practice who work primarily with the expatriate community.



This was my third trip to Thailand. In 2008, as part of my sabbatical, I had a Fulbright award at Burapha University. I taught two trauma courses and consulted on clinic development. In 2009 I

presented several workshops at an educators and mental health conference in Kota Kinabalu, Borneo, Malaysia. I also returned to Burapha University to work for several days. I am continuing to work with colleagues there on eating disorders, secondary trauma, resiliency, and clinic development. We try to have meetings via Skype, but Thailand is 13 hours ahead of Colorado, so not convenient for setting up meetings. Besides, it is more fun to be there in person!



I love working internationally and being part of the global community delivering workshops and consulting with colleagues. Some of my other 'work' trips included a sabbatical in France and Ireland where I taught an eating disorders course at the University of Toulouse and gave workshops in Waterford and Cork, Ireland. I enjoy opportunities to work and travel abroad. I recently had a paper accepted for a conference in Barcelona in the summer of 2012.

Future work will certainly include returning to Thailand. I would like to continue to assist in developing clinics similar to the UNC's Psychological Services Clinic in McKee Hall, to enhance the training of students, and to offer needed mental health services to communities. In my travels I have learned a lot, made good friends, and have had wonderful opportunities.



This past year my book *7 Skills for Parenting Success* was published into Korean (Berdahl, L. & Johnson, B.). The Korean publisher contacted us and obtained Translation Copyrights to have the book translated. The person who translated our book was a former minister of Early Childhood Education for the South Korean Government and is now a professor at a university there. We asked a Korean physician from Greeley to look at our English version of the Book and the Korean Translated version and he said the translation was excellent. I did cut and paste some sections of the book into Google translator, but I

got mostly gibberish, so I was relieved when he said the translation was good. While the book has a 2010 copyright, it really did not get onto book shelves in Korea until 2011.

There is a certain level of satisfaction to feel somebody from another country, language, and culture is interested in our work. Parent training is a relatively foreign concept in Eastern cultures. For example we have been told that there is not a word for “parenting” in Japanese. We are excited to see how our 7 Skills will be applied to another culture. There must be sufficient cross over as the publisher has recently contacted us to see if we would be interested in writing a book that focuses on parenting adolescents.

In the past year at the international level I was happy to be involved in the translation and adaptation of the Family of Origin Scale in Greece. The Family of Origin Scale (FOS) was originally created by Hovestadt and others. The findings in general supported the psychometric properties of

the FOS for use in Greece. I have a strong connection to Greece; my father is Greek and I completed elementary, high school, and one BA degree in Greece. Upon finishing my doctorate I taught in Greece at the University level for seven years and held a private practice. The Greek family has undergone many changes and it was of interest to me to adopt the FOS to be used both as a research and clinical tool. My co-researcher Dr. Petrogiannis, was one of my first students when I taught at the University of Ioannina in Greece. Our findings were published in the International Journal of Psychological Studies and presented at APA, 2011.



I also had a wonderful opportunity this past summer to present at the Interamerican Congress of Psychology in Medellin, Colombia, South America. Medellin was beautiful and the weather was perfect. I really liked the title of the conference—*For the health of the people: A psychology committed to social transformation* (the message was that psychology as a science and profession must work to improve the quality of life for all the people).



The presentations included *Dilemmas for Psychologists in the Disclosure of Extramarital Affairs in Couples Therapy* and *The Transformative Impact of the Reality and Myth of Equality: Implications for Psychologists*. This congress was a special occasion because it brought psychologists from all the Americas to collaborate and share ideas of psychology as a science and profession. The research and the experiences that were presented were very rich in cultural diversity and methodologies. The conference was in Spanish, which gave me an opportunity to brush up on my Spanish. The people were fantastic, very warm, friendly and hospitable. This conference also gave me an opportunity to reconnect with my childhood roots. My mother was born and raised in Colombia and I spent my childhood in Colombia.

March 1st, 2012: **External Practicum**

GA positions and other opportunities across campus

In the past couple of years, incoming students were offered a 10 hour GA in the Department. Their main duties included assisting faculty with research and sometimes as TAs. There are other GA opportunities around the University and some of our students were willing to share their experiences.

Laura Oyer has the GA position as a **Career Counselor at UNC Career Services**.

"There are several different things I do in this position. One of the main tasks includes providing career counseling to UNC students and alumni. This includes things like helping someone choose a major/career, critiquing resumes and cover letters, conducting mock interviews, discussing job search and networking strategies, and helping one find an internship," said Laura. Laura also interprets the Strong Interest Inventory (SII) and the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI) for students and alumni who are choosing or changing their major and/or career. "All of my work gets done during my GA hours. I have a scheduled 16 hours that I normally work each week; however, during fairs or other evening presentations, I might work 20 hours per week. My supervisors are very flexible and allow me to change my schedule if necessary," said Laura.

Meag-gan Walters teaches **University 101 (class for freshmen to help with the transition to college)**.

This position requires teaching full-class sections of students, attending weekly instructor staff meetings, holding office hours, creating activities / engaging instruction for the curriculum, and grading papers. "The workload depends on the amount of sections you teach. It's a fairly heavy workload because you want to be a good and impactful teacher. This requires creating supplementary materials and activities. I spent about 12 hours per week for this job," said Meag-gan. "It is a very worthwhile job for anyone interested in academia. The program facilitates young teachers into more effective educators."

Michael Jenkins-Guarnieri is an **instructor for Abnormal Psychology** at UNC.

Michael taught a semester-length undergraduate elective course covering theories of psychopathology and current research on psychological disorders (3 credits). For this, "I developed course materials following an engaged, learner-centered pedagogy, relying on case studies, group discussions, interactive lectures, and guest speakers" said Michael. Michael has also taught University 101 in the past.
