Chevron Scholarships Help CUE Students Become Teachers

"Education is one of our top priorities," Baird said. In fact, 43% of her unit's budget went to educational institutions and nonprofit organizations last year. For about two years, Chevron has supported students attending UNC's <u>Center for Urban Education</u> (CUE) teacher preparation program by funding need-based scholarships for teacher candidates.

"CUE is an important asset because it produces teachers who can meet the needs of Denver-area schools," said Baird. She noted that the Lowry campus is responsive to its students' needs and partners with area school districts to support deeper student learning. "Teachers are the most important factor in student success," said Baird. "We're honored to support CUE's efforts to get well-trained, diverse teachers into urban schools."

Rosanne Fulton, the director of CUE, said, "We are so grateful to Chevron for their support. In the last two years, we've been able to give substantial financial support to eight of our teacher candidates. We look forward to continuing our relationship with Cary and Chevron long term."
