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Let Us Count the Ways: Sources of **Funds for CUE Teacher Candidates**

College tuition can be a burden for many students and the thought of it can keep aspiring teacher candidates from pursuing a degree. In this article, we discuss the different types of funds available to the students at the UNC Center for Urban Education (CUE) and check in with three current students to see how they pay their way through school.




Since 2001, the Reisher Scholar program has given more than 450 UNC students financial

support. Awards range from \$4,000 to \$11,000 per year. Each group of students admitted to the Reisher program joins a cohort of seven to 15 students from their graduating class. With two cohorts each year, the program contributes roughly \$500,000 to UNC students annually. CUE student Martha Thomas is one such Reisher Scholar. "I always wanted to be a teacher so that I can help students feel good about themselves as my teachers did for me," said Thomas.

"If you want to attend college, don't worry about not having enough money," she said. "There are people at UNC who can help you access the funds you need." Thomas's sorority has awarded her scholarship funds for tuition and fees, and she also receives COSI scholarship funds, which we talk about next. Lastly, she received a federal

PELL grant while earning her associate's degree at the Community College of Aurora and continues to benefit from federal financial aid at CUE.



Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative After a highly competitive grant process, UNC was selected as a recipient of an \$850,000

Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative (COSI) Back to Work grant. The funds are intended

to provide new career paths for workers displaced by the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic while also addressing the need for teachers in Colorado's classrooms. UNC is using the funds to expand recruitment and retention at the Center for Urban Education.

Established in 2001 with a \$1.25 million gift from UNC alumna Ronda Stryker '76, the Stryker Institute for Leadership Development offers scholarships and leadership training as a participation-based scholarship program. It serves women from underrepresented groups and supports scholars in their identity and leadership development. Stryker has since contributed more than \$11 million to the program and has pledged an additional \$4 million over the next several years. To date, the program has transformed the

lives of 524 Stryker scholars and rippled out to the countless lives they've touched with their
