UNC's Women's Studies Program

Greetings from the Women's Studies Program at UNC! Women's Studies is the only place on campus you can study women's experiences and gender as a category of analysis. Our interdisciplinary approach to the study of women and gender can augment a number of minors—our students' majors are as diverse as Anthropology, Biology, Philosophy, English, Psychology, Sociology, and Art Education and more. So if you're excited about approaching knowledge from women's perspective, learning about women's experiences, understanding how gender affects the possibilities for women's and men's lives, and having fun while you learn, Women's Studies is the minor for you!

This spring we're offering some exciting courses you can take whether or not you're a minor. If you've never taken a women's studies course, our introductory class, WS 101, Women in Contemporary Society, is a good place to start. (This course fulfills the requirement for LAC areas 5 and 8.) We're also offering WS 240, Women Race and Class, a course that examines the intersecting dynamics and fundamental character of gender, race, class, and sexuality. Another course, WS 300, the History of [American] Feminism gives students an in-depth study of the history of feminist political movements and intellectual traditions in the United States. WS 335, Global Perspectives on Women analyzes the effects of modernization, economic development, and globalization on global women's lives. Together, these courses and others give you a solid background in the study of women and gender that can facilitate your approach to almost any topic of study. We hope to see you in class!

Past Events

Beyond Beats and Rhymes

On November 3rd, 2009 the Women's Resource Center along with the Women's Studies Program, the Department of Health and Environment and Human Services, Nu Alpha Kappa Fraternity Inc., Sigma Lambda Beta International Fraternity, Colorado Men Against Domestic Violence, and BAM (The Be a Man Fatherhood Program), screened the hip-hop documentary *Beyond Beats and Rhymes*. The purpose of this event was to challenge the student population into taking a closer look into hip-hop culture, what it was and what it has become. It was an opportunity for students to voice their opinions and here the opinions of others during the panel discussion which occurred at the end of the film. There were seven members on the panel, including five

UNC students, a professor of Women's Studies, and a hip hop artist. There were approximately 85 students in attendance. This event brought out issues such as violence, the treatment of women in music videos, as well as issues with homosexuality and hip hop culture. The sponsors of this event offered a safe environment for these issues to be discussed. The panel discussion was a lively forum with diverse ideas.

Open Mic Night

Following the hip hop documentary Beyond Beats and Rhymes, on November 4th, 2009 the Women's Resource Center hosted its first Open Mic Night of the year. This was an opportunity for students, community members, and anyone with a passion for art to come out and share their talent. While listening to others we enjoyed snacks and a warm environment. Several UNC students performed poetry, spoken word, and other forms of artistic expression, some of which will be showcased on the following pages of this newsletter. It is the hope that Open Mic Nights will continue here at the Women's Resource Center and give room for everyone who is willing to showcase their abilities!

Women of the World Potluck

On November 12th, 2009 The Women's Resource Center and the Center for International Education hosted a Women of the World Potluck. The purpose of this event was to unite the women of UNC as well as experience international cuisine and educational perspectives on diverse topics. This event was attended by 50 UNC faculty, staff and students as well as community members. Members of Black Women of Today, Janelle Lewis, Chez'ra Sankey and Cherie Jacobs, as well as teachers from the CASS Program gave presentations.

New Faces Of America

On November 10th, 2009 Will and Company graced the UNC Ballrooms with seven different portrayals of race in America under the heading "New Faces of America". This theatrical presentation touched on issues from a host of different problems such as suicide rates on Native American reservations, GLBTA issues and Christianity, as well as issues of race and ethnicity. Over 445 UNC students, faculty, staff and community members were in attendance and had the opportunity to experience this unique portrait of life in America.

Juana Bordas

On November 19th 2009, the President's Leadership Program brought speaker Juana Bordas to the UNC Campus. Juana Bordas is an author and activist who has dedicated her career to preparing Latino leaders in public, private, and non-profit sectors. She founded Mestiza Leadership International in 1995, which specializes in training and developing a work environment that encourages diversity and effective leadership.
