

The Purpose and Perception of Feminism

For a long period of time in my life, I was someone who was of the mindset that men and women are 100% equal in all areas, and that feminists were selfish, man-hating, women who wanted more of the share than they deserved. This, I thought until I talked with one of my friend who is a feminist. She pointed out many interesting things to me that made me reevaluate a feministic stand. The fact I never need to be scared when I walk home at night, that I got my current job at a place that didn't hire women, or that I am not primarily seen as a sexual object. My friend also pointed out that as a man I am constantly expected to be in a leadership or provider position, or that I am not supposed to be emotional. These insights hit me hard, and made me think more and more about feminism, its importance, and why we a negative perception of feminism persists.

I have come to know that feminism is not the belief that women are better than men, but that the patriarchy is a construct that hurts both men and woman. We are forced into certain gender roles, as men and women. The father becomes the main provider and makes all the decisions, and a mother who just stays at home and cooks and has no real authority. These are obviously bad perceptions that constrain both males and females. So if feminism is fighting these negative perceptions, then why does it in general have such negative connotations?

I think the main issue is that in many groups, the most negative people in a group tend to be the loudest. This doesn't just apply to feminism. Think about when we hear about radical religious groups, or protests. This puts an image in our head about all of those people. This could be our perception that all people of a religion are terrorists, or that all protesters are violent; even though most people are not such. With feminism, and social justice in general, people tend to have this view of people who are overly sensitive, arrogant, self-perceived victims, who hate men. In reality this isn't the case. Though there are definitely some who can appear as victims, and who are prejudice against men, this just isn't what the majority of feminists believe. It is primarily the idea of not needing to be tied down to certain stereotypes based on one's gender. Now, the big question is how we can fix this? I think that the solution is for those of us who are feminists, or even those who are for feminist ideals, to be open about our own and other people's beliefs. It is important for us to keep learning about all genders and see how patriarchy works. Its important to learn how to critique and not just be critical.
