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Stipends Make a Difference for Colorado's Rural Teachers

The \$6,000 <u>Rural Inservice Educator Stipend</u> helps meet the needs of Colorado's rural schools, one recipient at a time. A rural PK–12 educator may use the stipend to offset costs incurred to earn additional qualifications at a Colorado institution of higher education. The qualifications allow the recipient to:

- Teach concurrent enrollment courses;
- · Add an additional endorsement; or
- Fulfill a local faculty need.

The program is a joint effort of the <u>Colorado Center for Rural Education</u> and the <u>Colorado</u> <u>Department of Higher Education</u>.

We asked three recent recipients how the award will help them achieve their career goals.

Emily Barnett

Emily Barnett teaches fourth grade at Pioneer Elementary School in Fort Morgan, Colorado, in Morgan County School District No. Re-3.

She said, "I was stunned by the diversity when I first started teaching at Pioneer Elementary. I immediately thought about returning to school so that I could learn to serve the community better. Despite raising a young family and having a full-time job, it seemed plausible to pursue my master's degree in the

In my new position at Aspen Elementary, I would like to build a sense of team unity among the mathematics teachers

and help teachers implement a new math curriculum."

ADULT DEGREE COMPLETION

Partner Spotlight: Western Colorado University Adult Degree Completion New Degree Completion and Teacher Licensure Program Available—100% Online!

<u>Western Colorado University</u> (WCU) is offering a new <u>degree-completion program</u> that gives adults a path to complete their degrees and obtain a teaching license online. Though the program is available to any adult, it was designed for working professionals and paraprofessionals. Individuals may maintain their existing employment while attending classes.



In the final year of the program, students enter their student-teaching residency and are paired with a teacher mentor. They complete the remaining licensure coursework online and take the appropriate Praxis exams. The work culminates in a recommendation for an initial Colorado teaching licensure in either elementary education, special education, or secondary education.

The cost of the program for in-state students is \$376 per credit hour, and scholarship opportunities are available.

WCU has partnered with the Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative to offer up to \$2,000 to those who:

- · Have been out of school for two consecutive semesters; or
- Have been adversely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

In addition, students may receive up to \$10,000 through a one-time stipend offered by the Colorado Department of Education <u>Educator Recruitment and Retention program</u>. The stipend is available to paraprofessionals who agree to serve for three years:

- In any rural or small rural district in Colorado, in any licensure area; or
- In any Colorado district, in the licensure areas of secondary math, special education, or world languages.

The <u>Colorado Boards of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) Association</u> provides educational services to two or more school districts that alone cannot afford the service, or find it advantageous and cost-effective to cooperate with other districts.

The University of Colorado at Boulder offers an online <u>Teacher Leadership Program</u>. Students earn stackable graduate certificates in subjects such as "Social and Emotional Learning" and "Teaching Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Students" that can lead to an MA in Teacher Leadership.

<u>TEACH Colorado</u> links potential teachers with jobs in their districts and provides licensure support to paraprofessionals and high-school students who are interested in teaching.

Western Colorado University's <u>Adult Degree Completion Program</u> – General Studies + Teacher Licensure allows adults to complete their degrees and obtain a teaching license. The program is entirely online and allows individuals to maintain their existing employment while attending classes.
