The Professional Counseling Programs deliver graduate degree programs in Colorado Springs and Denver. The UNC Colorado Springs Center is conveniently located at the Oracle building. The UNC Denver Center operates on the Colorado Community College System's Lowry Campus. Both offer evening and weekend classes designed to meet the needs of adult learners and working professionals who have jobs, families, and other responsibilities. You study side-by-side with other professionals, sharing ideas, problems, and successes with those who face the same everyday challenges. For your convenience, additional advising and instruction is also offered using distance technologies.

About the Programs

The Professional Counseling Programs offer you a variety of choices for advanced study including three Professional Counseling master's degrees and a doctoral degree in Counselor Education. As a graduate student, you will be exposed to UNC's unique diversity of professional perspectives. The MA Clinical and the School Counseling Programs are nationally accredited by the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP). Graduate programs offered at UNC's Denver Center include: MA Clinical Counseling; MA Clinical Counseling with the Marriage and Family Licensure option; and MA in School Counseling. Graduate programs offered at UNC's Colorado Springs Center include: MA in Clinical Counseling; and MA in School Counseling. Colorado Springs Clinical Counseling students may also enroll in the MFT licensure option courses offered at the Denver Center.

WHAT MASTER'S DEGREE PROGRAMS ARE OFFERED IN DENVER AND COLORADO SPRINGS?

Clinical Counseling - *Master of Arts (M.A.)*

The Clinical Counseling program at the master's level prepares a professional counselor to work in private practice or various community settings such as mental health centers and residential treatment centers. Both the Colorado Springs and Denver Centers offer all of the courses required for completion of the degree. Students are also required to complete a 700 hour internship. (Program total: 60 credit hours.) The Clinical Counseling degree leads to licensure as a professional counselor. Students who wish to seek licensure as marriage and family therapists may take additional courses (10 credits in the weekend format) at the Denver Center.

School Counseling - *Master of Arts (M.A.)*

The School Counseling program at the master's level prepares a school counselor to work with children, adolescents, and adults in various settings, especially in school settings. Both the Colorado Springs and Denver Centers offer all courses required for degree completion. Students are also required to complete a 700 hour internship. (Program total: 60 credit hours.)

HOW DO YOU APPLY?

M.A. Admissions

Applicants for admission to master's degree programs in School Counseling and Community Counseling at UNC's Colorado Springs or Denver Center must observe the following requirements for admission:

1. Submit the Notice of Intent form (enclosed) directly to the School of Applied Psychology and Counselor Education Campus Box 131 UNC Greeley, CO 80639.
2. Apply to the University of Northern Colorado, Graduate School, by completing and submitting the "Application for Graduate Admission", which is found at www.unco.edu/grad. There is a \$50 application fee. Contact the School of Applied Psychology and Counselor Education for application deadlines for Colorado Springs or the Denver Center.
3. If your GPA is less than 3.0 on your last 60 semester hours of course work, you are required to take the GRE. If your GPA is 3.0 or higher on your last 60 semester hours of course work, the GRE is waived. A combined score of 1000 on the verbal and quantitative sub test (with no sub test below 400) on the GRE, and a score of 3.5 or higher in analytical writing, are the recommended cut-off for acceptance into these graduate degree programs. Applicants who provide a lower combined total score may be considered under the "whole person" concept.
4. Complete the School of Applied Psychology and Counselor Education application materials and send completed packages directly to the APCE Office in Greeley. The address is APCE, Attn. Gloria Sedillos, 248 McKee Hall Campus Box 131, University of Northern Colorado, Greeley, CO 80639. Late applications may not be considered.
 - a. Three personal reference forms
 - b. MA supplemental data form
 - c. Personal background statement
5. You are required to take the Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory 2 (MMPI-2). Applicants may take the MMPI by appointment at either the Colorado Springs or Denver Center locations. There is a fee of \$25 payable by check to UNC for the cost of the test.
6. The final step of the admissions process is to attend an admissions workshop. Please check our website www.unco.edu/extendedstudies or contact Gloria Sedillos at the Greeley campus for the workshop dates 970-351-2731
