**SOC 100-947: Principles of Sociology (3 credits)**

**Course Description**

Overview of basic theories, methods, concepts and issues central to the discipline of sociology. Examine the relationship between social behavior and society.

**Course Goals and Content**

The purpose of this course is to introduce you to the field of sociology and the sociological perspective. The sociological perspective is the view that human behavior can only be understood within the framework of social components. Culture, family structure, religion, income, ethnicity and gender are some examples of influential social variables that we will explore. This course should stimulate your sociological imagination and your ability to think critically about the social world around you.

This course has the following learning outcomes:

- \* understand the framework, worldview, or philosophical assumptions of the discipline.
- \* understand the methods and research skills used by the discipline.
- \* understand the principles and theories of the discipline.
- \* demonstrate familiarity with current problems.

**Readings and Other Course Materials**

Readings come from James M. Henslin's *Essentials of Sociology: A Down-to Earth Approach*, 7th edition (Allyn and Bacon, 2007). You also are responsible for the lecture material for each unit (located under Course Materials on the course website) and the content of class-wide online discussions. Readings should be completed by the date posted in order to keep up with the course. Also, the text website ([ablongman.com/henslin](http://ablongman.com/henslin)) has a study guide and allows you to take practice tests similar to the exams you will be given in this course. Just click on the relevant chapters and you will see a button for practice questions. If you have questions or concerns about anything, you are encouraged to contact me throughout the course.

**Evaluation**

Grades will be based on three equally weighted exams (75% of final grade) and assignments (25% of final grade). More specifically, the maximum number of points possible for each evaluative component is as follows:

Exam 1	= 100 pts
Exam 2	= 100 pts
Exam 3	= 100 pts
Introduction to group	= 10 pts
3 essays/discussion posts in Unit 1	= 30 pts
3 essays/discussion posts in Unit 2	= 30 pts
3 essays/discussion posts in Unit 3	= 30 pts
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Total possible points	= 400

Your grade for the course is calculated based on the percentage of the total possible points that you obtain-- A = 90% - 100%; B = 80% - 89%; C = 70% - 79%; D = 60% - 69%; F = 59% or less. Detailed descriptions of exams and assignments are discussed below.

**Exams:**

Exams may include short answer, true-false, multiple-choice, and essay questions. Note that all course material, including readings, lectures, class-wide discussions and any other posted material may appear on exams. Exams will be available online on the date of the exam from 7am to 7pm only. You will only be able to take the exam once, and once you start the exam, you must finish and submit it within the designated time limit. You will not be able to go back to questions you have already answered. So for each exam date, decide in advance on free time that day in which you will be at a secure internet connection where you will have quiet so that you can focus on your exam. Also, note that these are closed book/note exams. You need to work alone and without any materials—just as if you were taking the exam in a classroom. To do otherwise is cheating and means you won't learn much. . . Also, know that if you begin the exam and your internet connection fails for any reason, you will have to take the make-up exam on the last day of the class. So please, use a very secure connection!!

**Assignments:**

In order to facilitate getting to know each other and having substantial discussions, I am dividing the class into groups of 8 or so. To find your group number, click on COMMUNICATIONS then the GROUP PAGES button. If this doesn't work, contact me because if you added the course late, you may not be on my list. It is YOUR responsibility to make sure you are in a group BEFORE the first assignment is due. All assignments must be posted to and appear on your group discussion board (not be in draft form) in order to get credit for them (NOT the class-wide board). The points associated with each assignment are:

- Introduction =10
- Discussion- Unit 1 =30
- Discussion- Unit 2 =30
- Discussion- Unit 3 =30
- Total 100

Introduction: Your first assignment is to introduce yourself to your group. Offer at least one rich paragraph about who you are at this point in your life. This getting-to-know-each-other process facilitates substantial discussion on the interesting topics to come.

For the Discussion for each unit, you need to offer at least 3 substantial (1 or more paragraphs EACH) responses to EACH unit's materials (9 minimum for the course for full credit). Only one post per day counts so for full credit, you need to post on at least THREE DIFFERENT days in EACH unit. The first response might be your thoughtful examples from your own observations or life that connect to principles described in that unit or a critique or supporting point about unit ideas. The idea is to play with the course content in significant ways and share that with your group. Later responses in a unit might be responses to the posts of others. In all cases, your posts should be prepared in advance so that they are well-written and efficiently presented. Posts with spelling errors or typos won't receive any credit. More is not better, and please do not simply summarize course readings or lectures. Add to what we know/think. If your post is empty— you have simply repeated ideas or congratulated the author of the previous post— you will receive NO credit. You are welcome to do those kinds of posts but make sure you also have 3 substantial posts per unit for full credit. Note that I determine whether or not your discussion is substantial and worth full credit. To assure yourself full credit, do much more than the minimum required of you! Finally, please don't ask questions or make comments to me on your group discussion board. This is YOUR place. Ask questions in the class-wide board. Note though that I will be monitoring your group board in order to assess credit for each unit in terms of your assignments so . . . if you want to have PRIVATE conversations with your group members, use their individual e-mail!! Also, I may put your responses on the class-wide board for the whole class to discuss so do not post anything that you are not comfortable sharing with the whole class.

Assignment due dates are strict. No late assignments will be accepted. REALLY!! They defeat the purpose of being involved with your group's discussion, and they do not help your group. SO post your assignments early to avoid technical, health, or other possible delays. The due dates for the discussion are as follows—you must make at least three substantial posts on THREE DIFFERENT DAYS BY the due date for that unit to receive full discussion credit. No one wants to discuss Unit 1 ideas on the exam day or during Unit 2. . . If you do not understand this, ask questions. I expect almost all of you will get full credit for each unit. These online discussions are intended to get you thinking, make the ideas your own, and facilitate group interaction about course topics. Additionally, you may want to use your online group as a source of study buddies.

### **Class-wide Discussion Board**

In the class-wide discussion board, you may post comments or questions about course content or course mechanics, and I will respond to them there. This way everyone in the class benefits from the interaction. So I will interact with you on the class-wide discussion board. Please don't ask questions or make comments to me on your group's discussion board. Note that under no circumstances will posts to the CLASS-WIDE board count toward your grade. Only posts on YOUR GROUP board count toward your assignment grade. Moreover, all postings on the class-wide discussion board are required course content and may be included on exams. So be sure to keep up with what is on the course-wide discussion board.

### **Final comments**

This is a full 15-week semester course being offered in just a few weeks. As a consequence, you need to do about 4 times the work each week compared to what you do for a course offered during a regular semester. Please— 1. Read this syllabus carefully and note all due dates— they come quite quickly. Do not fall behind! 2. Because the course is online, you have to be able to work hard—ON YOUR OWN. Do not just read chapters. . . study and learn them so that you can talk about specific issues, findings and concepts. You should be able to teach the ideas to someone else. A casual understanding of the basic topics is NOT enough to be successful in this course 3. Note that NO extra credit is offered. You must do the course as it is designed. 4. If you do not understand something, please ASK!!!
