**SOC 235 - Social Change in a Global Context**

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**Course Description**

We will examine theories of social change as well as the many factors that can combine in order to bring about social change. We will study approaches to change including social movements and revolutions as the product of social factors. We will compare the processes of change in underdeveloped countries with the processes of change in industrial societies.

**Course Requirements**

Regular online attendance is required. All persons taking the course for credit will be graded on the basis of their performance on four examinations and four discussions.

**Examinations** are designed to test your command of the assigned readings. Each examination will be made up of 25 true/false, multiple fill-in and multiple choice questions. Questions will involve important facts and assertions from the assigned readings (Please see attached Topical Agenda). Assigned reading materials may be used during examinations.

Examinations are taken online, and may be accessed via the "Exams" link on the course Home Page. In order to avoid penalties, examinations must be taken within designated time periods. Late exams are excused only with prior approval by the instructor, and if the instructor is notified in writing well in advance of the exam. All other late exams will be downgraded by five (5) points.

When participating in **Discussions** (except Discussion # 1, the "Ice Breaker") you will be required to refer to, and to cite in-text, assigned reading materials, **plus** information from **online lectures and Power Point presentations** as well as relevant web-based material you find. You will also

be encouraged to cite other appropriate scholarly material. Participating late in Discussions is excused only with prior approval by the instructor, and if the instructor is notified in writing well in advance of the end of a Discussion period. All other late Discussion participation will result in a penalty of (5) points per Discussion. Discussions can be accessed using the "Discussion Board" link on the course Home Page.

**Discussions and Exams are available on Blackboard (<http://unco.blackboard.com>). The login and password for Blackboard is the same as you use when accessing URSA. In your CLEARLY LABELED Main Post, provide the addresses of the sites. IN YOUR OWN WORDS, describe the contents of each site, and explain how EACH SITE provides information about social change, globalization and Third World industrialization as well as other important concepts found in the Chapters 1-4 of our textbook. As you develop your main post, and as you introduce EACH important concept, **please place in bold and underline or highlight** the concept, and please cite, in-text, the textbook page numbers where the concept is discussed, as well as the **lecture and/or Power Point presentation** where the concept was discussed. Example: For the concept "**globalization**," the in-text textbook citation would look like this: (Text, p. 103). The lecture citation would look like this: (Chapter 4 Lecture). The Power Point citation would look like this: (Chapter 4 Power Point, Slide #12) **Note: Textbook, Power Point and lecture material must be included, and cited in-text. This is how you prove to me that you have studied the material.**

Finally, IN YOUR OWN WORDS, using, and citing it in-text, material found in Development and Social Change as well as in lectures and videos, comment on the main posts of three classmates. Citations for Development and Social Change, lectures and Power Point presentations would look like this: (Text, pp. 103-105), (Chapter 3 Lecture) and (Chapter 2 Power Point presentation, Slides 2-4). Note: This is a required part of the class. Possible points: 25 maximum. In order to earn maximum points, please select websites that other members of the class have not already discussed.
