Both read-ins brought together members of the UNC and larger Greeley communities for what could become a new tradition of celebrating the voices of writers and readers at UNC.

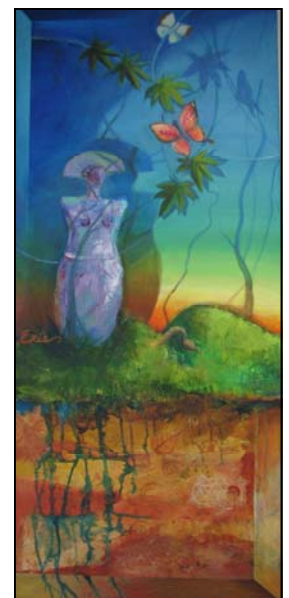


The Technical Services Department is embarking on a new and challenging undertaking, a re-organization of jobs and units within Technical Services in order to promote professional development, create a transparent

## Holiday Service Project Brings Together Two Libraries

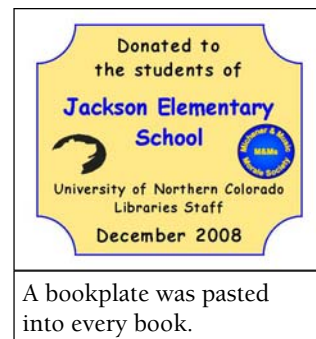
Employees of the University Libraries once again collaborated on a Holiday Service Project. This year they continued the relationship with Jackson Elementary School in Greeley that started with a project in the fall.

The holiday project got underway early in December with employees collecting new and gently used books to be donated to the library at Jackson School. Over 200 books appropriate for pre-school through 5th grades, including fiction, non-fiction and reference books, were



donated for library and classroom use. Among the titles were some old familiar favorites: *Don't Know Much About the 50 States*, *A Wrinkle in Time*, *Go, Dog, Go!*, *The Secret Garden*, *Where the Sidewalk Ends*, and select *Harry Potter* titles.

One morning just before the school let out for Winter Break, representatives from the University Libraries delivered books to Joy Gallison, Jackson School librarian and stayed to assist Ms. Gallison with a group of 5th graders who had come to use the library that morning. What a great opportunity to interact with potential UNC Bears!



A bookplate was pasted into every book.

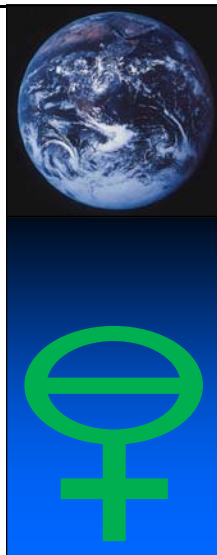
## Libraries Contributes to Earth Reveries with Reading Group, Art Exhibits

Womens Studies Librarian Annie Epperson contributed to Earth Reveries, a campus-wide initiative launched by the College of Performing and Visual Arts.

Connecting an interest in environmentalism and her responsibilities in Womens Studies, Epperson created *Women's Reverence for the Earth—Fact & Fiction*. Selected readings supported discussion devoted to ecofeminism, feminist theories and women's role in the environmental movement.

The group met on alternating Thursdays, and merited a write-up in *The Mirror*, UNC's campus newspaper.

Two exhibits with ties to Earth Reveries were shown in the reference area of Michener Library as well. *Earth Dreaming* displayed original work by Eris Klein, and *Material & Hungry World*, coordinated by Professor Richard Jurin, featured photographs from the books "Material World" and "Hungry Planet."



## News Room Popular

The News Room area between the main entrance to Michener and the newly-remodeled Access Services desk is popular with students at all times of the day, and particularly appealing when notable figures are being broadcast on the flat panel television.
