

# UNC Police Department Campus Security Report

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## Introduction

The University of Northern Colorado is committed to making its campus a safe and secure campus where the pursuit of higher education can take place while balancing individual rights, responsibilities and freedoms.

Many positive steps have been taken to reach that objective, including placing highly visible emergency telephones throughout campus, upgrading lighting along our sidewalks and in our parking lots, and increasing safety and crime reduction programs for students. In addition, the University has a well-publicized Drug and Alcohol policy and Student Code of Conduct that is vigorously enforced.

Although our campus our campus is typically viewed as conservative, quiet, and reasonable safe, the University is a community with a number of people from different backgrounds, much like any other "city". This, combined with the fact that the University is an open campus, lends to the possibility of a criminal act occurring against a member of the University community despite the best efforts of the Police and Administrative staff.

It is for this reason the University continually strives to upgrade the campus' physical security, improve crime reduction programs, and provide proactive policing. It is imperative, however, that students and employees also accept responsibility for their own security and the security of others. We encourage everyone to report criminal actions, emergencies or suspicious activity immediately to the University Police.

The University has reported its crime statistics to the FBI through the Uniform Crime Reports for many years. This reporting is used to identify problem areas and develop plans to address those problems. The data contained in this statement are published because the University feels it is vital for prospective students or present members of the University community to be able to make informed decisions about their personal safety. These data are also used to identify areas in which individuals need to take extra precautions to protect their property. Additional questions regarding crime statistics or campus safety may be directed to the University Police in Gray Hall.

## Reporting of Criminal or Suspicious Actions

The University Police Department is responsible for law enforcement, public safety, security, traffic control, and emergency response at UNC. The primary office is located in Gray Hall on Central Campus and is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to serve the University community.

To report a crime, emergency, or suspicious activity, a person need only dial 911 from any telephone. 911 calls from on-campus telephones ring directly to the University Police Communications Center, while 911 calls from off-campus telephones (including cellphones) ring directly to the Weld County Communications Center. The non-emergency number for the UNC Police Department is (970) 351-2245 (dial 1-2245 from an on-campus phone). Public telephones are located in the lobbies or public areas of most campus buildings.

Numerous well-marked exterior emergency telephones are located throughout campus along main sidewalks. When activated, these telephones ring directly to the UNC Police Communications Center. Officers can be immediately dispatched to investigate, especially if no voice communication is initiated. All campus elevators also have emergency buttons that are activated by holding down a button and ring automatically to the University Police.

The University Police maintain both telephone and two-way radio contact with the Greeley Police Department, Union Colony Fire Department, Weld County Ambulance Service, and UNC Facility Operations. Emergency calls receive priority, with those concerning personal safety or welfare receiving the highest priority.

All crimes are taken seriously from the smallest theft to the most serious injury. There are no acceptable minimal losses. Fortunately, the volume of calls and number of officers allows for timely response to reports of crime at this time. We subscribe to the idea that a crime affects more than just the immediate victim. It also affects their friends, roommates, and parents, and can instill fear in the University community. Basically, if there are leads (also called solvability factors) to follow, the case will receive attention.

With respect to sexual assault, all cases are investigated fully and submitted to the District Attorney for prosecutorial review. The District Attorney will determine whether or not criminal charges are pursued.

The University subscribes to a developmental approach in its efforts: Persons who are arrested or charged with crimes may also be held accountable to UNC's administrative discipline as well as criminal court action. Administrative action is conducted in a timely manner and, in many cases, long before the criminal court disposition is reached. Students are held accountable for their actions, and priority is given in instances of violence, sexual assault/harassment, and acts involving safety such as fire and illegal drugs. In many cases where criminal action is not or cannot be taken, administrative action is still pursued. For a more detailed description, refer to the Student Code of Conduct in the Student Handbook.

## **Duty to Report**

It is imperative that the University community reports criminal and suspicious activity to the University Police. Timely reports allow for timely response and eventually to a safer campus. Do your part, report!

Colorado Statute 18-8-115 "Duty to Report a Crime" states:

It is the duty of every corporation or person who has reasonable grounds to believe a crime has been committed to report promptly the suspected crime to law enforcement authorities.

Colorado is a "Duty to Report" state. Therefore, the crime statistics published in this report are gathered from all persons at the University. Faculty, staff, administrators and employees are required to report any crime they become aware of to the University Police. In addition, the University has designated the University Police as the sole reporting site. Only licensed counselors at the University Counseling Center and victim Advocates at the Assault Survivors Advocacy program, are exempt from the reporting requirement. State statute provides these professionals with confidentiality. Colorado is also an "Open Records" State. This means there are no confidential crime reports, arrests, or public records. The University of Northern Colorado requires all its employees to comply with the appropriate laws of the State of Colorado and federal statutes.

## **Access to Campus Facilities**

Most campus buildings and facilities are accessible to members of the campus community, guests, and visitors during normal hours of business, Monday-Friday, and for limited designated hours on Saturdays and Sundays, during periods of time the University is in normal operation (this includes most holidays). Residence halls have resident staff living in each building. A Hall Director and Assistant Hall Director live in most residence halls, with Resident Assistants (RAs) living on most floors. Residence Life staff provide security of the residence hall as well as building repair, coaching/support, programming, activities, and rule compliance. Most halls have a staff person on duty at the front desk on a 24-hour basis. Regular foot patrols or "rounds" are made of the hallways in the evenings. To prevent unauthorized access, residence halls have an electronic door locking system.

Residence halls on the UNC campus are locked 24-hours a day. All persons are required to pass the front security desk to gain entrance into the building. Also, after 11:00 p.m., visitors and guests are required to be registered and signed-in by a resident at the front desk of the residence hall. The visitor/guest must present a picture ID. Visitors without a picture ID and a resident to sign them into the building are denied entrance. Visitors/guests found not to be in the company of a hall resident are removed from the building. From 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., residents can use the card reader access to gain entrance to their residence halls from side doors. Further enhancements of the system are planned for all residence halls.

Residence Life subscribes to a vigorous personal accountability disciplinary program. This program is developmental in nature, but provides for the removal of problem individuals or persons who commit crimes. Most disciplinary action takes place within 48 hours of the violation. Special emphasis is placed on supporting and protecting victims.

### **Maintenance and Security of Campus Facilities**

The University community maintains a very strong commitment to campus safety and security. Exterior lighting is an important part of this commitment. Police Officers and other staff members report exterior lighting problems on campus on a regular basis to the Facility Operations repair crews. Members of the Police Department, Facility Operations, and other campus representatives conduct surveys of exterior lighting on an on-going basis.

Members of the campus community are encouraged to report any exterior lighting deficiencies to the Police Department at 351-2245, or Facilities Operations at 351-2446.

Police Officers report any defective locking mechanisms to the Facilities Operations Lock Shop as soon as they are discovered. This is to ensure that each exterior door and its locking mechanisms are working properly. Exterior doors on campus buildings are locked and secured each evening by computer access control or custodians from Facilities Operations. These employees also report door and security hardware operating deficiencies on a regular basis. The University is also converting to a high security lock/key system. These locks are extremely difficult to pick, and keys cannot be duplicated.

Many areas on campus that house expensive equipment have alarms with motion detectors that report directly to the University Police. As well, there are many offices on campus that are equipped with "duress" alarm systems to summon help in the event of a crisis.

Shrubbery, trees, and other vegetation on campus are trimmed on a regular basis both for aesthetics and safety. In snow or icy weather, sidewalks are a priority for cleaning and sanding. Supplemental sanding is done by the UNC Grounds Department as needed. Parking lots and campus areas are actively patrolled by police officers, student parking enforcement officers, and student security officers. UNC maintenance and ground workers carry radios and can call the University Police directly with any problem or suspicious activity.

### **Law Enforcement Authority and Inter-agency Relationships**

The University Police Department is a full-service police agency with full police powers on and off campus as granted by the State. The department is accredited by the Colorado Association of Chiefs of Police.

University Police officers are level one, certified police officers in the state of Colorado and are trained in the same manner as all other public law enforcement officers in the State. They receive at least 40 hours of additional training each year through the department. The Department subscribes

to a community-oriented policing philosophy and its officers are selected, in part, due to their strong skills in working with young people.

The University Police Department maintains a close working relationship with the Greeley Police Department, the Weld County Sheriff's Office, and other surrounding police agencies. Mutual Aid agreements are in force that not only provide for assistance when needed, but also allow for shared training and cooperative selective enforcement efforts. Working relationships are also maintained with state, federal, and all other appropriate components of the criminal justice system.

A number of recognized student organizations maintain either meeting or living facilities in off campus locations. Through the Mutual Aid agreement, the Greeley Police Department provides UNC with reports of criminal and non-criminal incidents occurring at these off-campus facilities. These reports are evaluated by the Dean of Students to determine if administrative action is warranted to address problems either affecting students or that are caused by students. In many cases, the University Police assist Greeley Police at incidents involving students off campus. Typically a cooperative "town-gown" relationship and response is much more effective than any singular effort.

### **Security Awareness and Crime Prevention Programs**

It is the philosophy of UNC that we would much rather prevent crimes from occurring than to react to them after the fact. A primary vehicle for accomplishing this goal is the University's comprehensive crime prevention program, which is based on dual concepts of eliminating or minimizing criminal opportunities whenever possible, and encouraging students and employees to be responsible for their own security and the security of others. The following is a list of the most frequently used crime prevention programs employed by UNC:

- **Escort Programs:** Provide both walking and golf cart escort service by police officers or student security officers during hours of darkness for persons wanting to take extra precautions.
- **Ride Along Programs:** Students and community members may ride along with an officer. This experience allows for first hand exposure and insight into campus policing and law enforcement.
- **Emergency Telephones:** Both interior and exterior emergency phones are linked directly to University Police Department and are located throughout the University. [Click here to see a map of their locations.](#)
- **Crime Prevention Presentations:** Numerous crime prevention presentations are made annually to campus groups such as University employees, commuter students, residence hall students, international students, disabled students, student government, faculty and staff, specific campus departments, recognized student organizations and intercollegiate athletics. Typically over 150 programs are presented to over 5,000 people annually.

- **Printed Crime Prevention Materials:** Printed crime prevention brochures and posters related to substance abuse, personal safety, seat belt use, motor vehicle security, bicycle security, residence hall security, employee security, and sexual assault prevention are distributed at crime prevention presentations and at various locations throughout the University's campuses.
- **Electronic Alarm Systems:** A sophisticated computer-based electronic monitoring system located at the University Police Department monitors a comprehensive network of intrusion, fire, and environmental alarms. A backup system is located in the Facility Operations building.
- **Security Surveys:** Comprehensive security surveys or audits are made for a number of campus facilities each year.
- **Facility Surveys:** Surveys of exterior lighting, exterior doors and grounds are conducted by the officers on a continual basis.
- **Operation Identification:** (Operation ID), the logging of personal identification numbers, engraved, or owner recognized number, on items of value, is strongly promoted in student residence facilities when the students move in.
- **Bicycle Registration:** Formal identification of bikes is made to deter theft and aid in their recovery if lost or stolen. Your bicycle can be registered through [Parking Services](#).
- **Victim Advocacy:** Victims of sexual assault are counseled and supported by members of a special team from [ASAP \(Assault Survivors Advocacy Program\)](#) who work directly with victims and Police. Advocates are trained and sensitized to the emotional and physical needs of the victims.
- **Sexual Assault and Personal Safety Awareness, Education, and Prevention:** In cooperation with the SAFE (Sexual Assault Free Environment) committee and [ASAP \(Assault Survivors Advocacy Program\)](#), numerous sexual assault and personal safety awareness, education, and prevention presentations are made each year to members of the campus community. In addition, a "Safe Week" is sponsored by SAFE every year.
- **Alcohol Enforcement and Education:** Programs are presented/co-hosted with the UNC Drug and Alcohol Prevention Office. These programs provide violators with a crime-alcohol relationship perspective and promote responsible alcohol use. A six-hour drug/alcohol program is also taught as a consequence of under-age alcohol violations for first-time offenders.
- **Stop, Look and Listen:** Freshmen students are required to attend this two-hour workshop offered during summer orientation. The workshop is highly interactive and addresses issues of health, safety, communication, sexual assault, peer pressure, alcohol/drug use, and relationships. Over 2,000 students attend this important program each year.

## Reports of Crimes to the Community

Numerous efforts are made to advise members of the community on a timely basis about campus crime and crime-related problems. These efforts include the following:

1. **Annual Report:** A comprehensive report of crime-related information is compiled annually. It is published on the UNC Police Department web site and contains all crime statistics. It is available online at <http://www.unco.edu/police>.
2. **Newspapers:** The Police Department maintains a news release reading board. It contains a crime log and officer activity reports. The records are available to the media and citizens as public record in compliance with Colorado Open Records laws. UNC's campus newspapers, *The Mirror* and *The Connection*, as well as various local news media, check this resource several times a week.
3. **Special Alerts:** If circumstances warrant it, special news releases are prepared and the news media are informed of critical information. In addition, flyers may be printed and sent to all departments on campus and/or posted in buildings. Another resource is the use of "electronic mail" via the campus computer network. In this case, "crime alerts" are issued with the request that they be shared with everyone in the department and that professors announce the alert at the beginning of classes that day.
4. **Police Log:** The Police Department maintains a "police log" that briefly denotes crimes and activity on campus. It is available to anyone to view at the Police Department.
5. **UNC Emergency Alerts:** If a situation warrants it, the UNC Police Department has the ability to initiate an emergency alert. All UNC staff, faculty, and students have the option to sign up for this program to receive emergency notifications on their cell phones. This system is tested once a semester to ensure everyone who is signed up for the system is receiving messages properly. ## Timely Warning Policy

In the event that a situation arises on or off campus that the Chief of the University of Northern Colorado Police, in consultation with the General Counsel, determines is an ongoing or continuing threat, a campus wide "timely warning" may be issued through the UNC e-mail system to active @unco.edu addresses. The warning also may be posted on the UNC Police website at <http://www.unco.edu/police/timelywarnings.html>, distributed through UNC Today email communications and available at the UNC Today website at <http://www.unco.edu/news>.

Depending on the particular circumstances of the crime, especially in situations that pose an immediate or on-going threat to the community and individuals, a copy of the notice may be posted in each residence hall, on-campus building, and fraternity and sorority houses.

Anyone with information warranting a timely warning should report the circumstances to the University Police office, by phone (970) 351-2245 or 1-2245 or in person at the Police headquarters in Gray Hall.

## **Drug and Alcohol Policy**

### **Drug Policy**

The University prohibits the unlawful or unauthorized manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or consumption, sale or use of controlled substances on or in University-owned or controlled property or in the course of University business or activities. Individuals or entities including, but not limited to, students, employees, contractors, agents, volunteers or invitees, who violate this policy shall be subject to discipline, termination/dismissal, debarment, arrest, or citation, as applicable. Additionally employees or students who violate this policy may be required to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program offered by the University.

### **Alcohol Policy**

The administration, faculty, and students of the University of Northern Colorado assert that the misuse/abuse of alcohol has no valid place in any University of Northern Colorado tradition. The administration, faculty, and students affirm their support for those programs leading to a wider understanding of the use, misuse, and abuse of alcohol, and encourage further educational efforts designed for all members of the University community to make informed choices where alcohol is involved. The complete Drug and Alcohol policy is published in the [Student Handbook](#) and in the pamphlet, *A Matter of Facts*, which is distributed to all students and staff at UNC (Section 1213 of the Higher Education Act of 1965). This policy is strictly enforced. We have found that the abuse of alcohol and drugs is a factor in many other criminal acts on campus. As a result of recent changes to the Cleary Act, institutions of higher education are now able to contact the parents of dependent students regarding drug/alcohol usage. As a result, UNC can and may contact parents in the event that their dependent child is involved in a drug or alcohol related incident. Each incident is evaluated on a case by case basis. Generally, parents will be notified when their dependent child is taken to the hospital or to Detox, received more than one alcohol/drug citation, or is involved in any incident that involves more than just alcohol consumption/possession. Over the past decade, the University Police, Greeley Police, Dean of Students, Residence Life, UNC Drug and Alcohol Office, District Attorney, and courts have formed a partnership to address underage drinking and alcohol associated issues. This has resulted in increased enforcement, multiple accountability, education, and numerous optional activities. The result has been a decrease in crime and disorderly behavior.

### **Sexual Assault Issues/Resources**

In compliance with Colorado State law and the Duty to Report Statute, all University employees are required to report all crimes committed on campus, including sexual assault, to the UNC Police Department. The only exception to this clause is with agencies that have an established

client/patient confidentiality relationship. It is the policy of the UNC Police Department to fully investigate all rumored or reported sexual assaults occurring on campus. Cases with an identified perpetrator are submitted to the District Attorney's Office for review, and if appropriate, filing of criminal charges.

In addition to criminal sanctions, students may be subject to administrative discipline for behaviors, such as sexual assault, which violate the Student Code of Conduct. In circumstances where it is established that a sexual assault has occurred, the perpetrator may be subject to a number of administrative sanctions. These ramifications are outlined under "Sanctions for Misconduct" in the Student Handbook and range from an official University warning to expulsion from the University. During any formal sexual assault administrative hearing, both the victim and the accused shall be free from intimidation, harassment, and retaliation. The victim and accused have the same opportunities for assistance during a hearing, and both will be notified of the outcome in a timely manner. There are a number of rights and procedures afforded to both the victim and the accused. For a detailed summary of sexual assault procedures, refer to the Student Handbook.

In the event a student is sexually assaulted, we strongly encourage reporting of the incident as soon as possible. Prompt reporting increases the likelihood of apprehending the perpetrator and preventing similar assaults. All sexual assaults that occur on campus should be reported to the UNC Police Department by calling 351-2245. If the assault occurred off-campus, the report should be made to the local police agency where the crime occurred. Always call 911 in the case of an emergency! If in doubt, call the University Police. They will facilitate notifying the proper agency and other appropriate services to assist the victim.

While waiting for the police to respond it is important that you NOT shower, douche, change clothes, or clean up in any way. Doing so may lose valuable evidence. Time can also be critical. Some date-rape drugs disappear from the body in a matter of hours. Don't delay – report immediately! Sexual assaults can have devastating consequences for all involved.

To further assist victims of sexual assault, the University will also facilitate appropriate and reasonable housing and/or academic changes as requested. In this event, the Director of Residence Life and the Dean of Students should be contacted to assist in the process.

### **Sex Offender Registration Information**

Registered sex offenders who are students, employed by, or volunteers for the University of Northern Colorado are required to advise their local law enforcement agency of their affiliation with UNC. This information is forwarded to the Colorado Bureau of Investigations (CBI), and is available at the UNC Police Department during normal business hours. The individual making the request will be provided with the list of registered sex offenders to view.

State and federal law require the release of information supplied by the Colorado Crime Information Center (CCIC) on registered sex offenders. The release of such information does not violate the Family Educational Rights to Privacy Act (FERPA).

In the event the UNC Police records staff are unavailable to provide the requested information immediately, the name and phone number of the individual making the request will be taken and he/she will be notified when the report is available. All requests will be processed and made available for review within 72 hours of the request.

### **Campus Security Act Crime Statistics**

The University of Northern Colorado believes that an informed community is a safety conscious community. The following statistics, provided in compliance with the Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act of 1990, are for your information so you can make more informed decisions on your safety. It should be remembered that these numbers only provide part of the crime/safety picture. The whole picture should include statistics, enforcement, programming, prevention, and physical plant improvements. Also, a large number does not of itself mean that there is a significant problem. While there are a high number of alcohol violation arrests, we have experienced a drop in disorderly conduct incidents, noise disturbances, thefts, and simple assaults. Clearly, an increased emphasis on enforcement can have an effect on crime. Similarly, an aggressive sexual assault

prevention program will also increase the number of reported sexual assaults. Sexual assault is historically a very under-reported crime. Increased numbers compiled with good programming usually means increased awareness and reporting – not increased crimes.
