

Mean Loneliness Scores




In Active Duty Soldiers

Preliminary data collected from 14 Active Duty Service Members had a mean Loneliness Score of 44.928. According to previous research done using the same UCLA Loneliness Scale (version 3), this a significantly higher mean.

Of these fourteen individuals, half strongly disagreed that they had control over where they lived and 13 live over 4,000 miles away from their home of record.

Half of the individuals were married or in a committed romantic relationship. The mean loneliness score of these individuals was lower than the mean of the single individuals.



Hypothesis:

- Service Members stationed farther from their home of record and individuals that do not feel they have control over where they live will display a high loneliness score.
- Service Members that are highly mobile, calculated by the amount of times moved, will display a high loneliness score
- Service Members that are married or are in a committed romantic relationship will display a lower loneliness score
