#### Introduction:

What is The Four Branches of the Mabinogi?

- A classic Welsh literature book that takes place in the Middle Welsh.
- Written anonymously in the late 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> centuries.
- A narrative following the family of Carey, known as Pyderi in the original Welsh language.

#### Abstract:

- Examines the idea of magic and animal transformation in *The Four Branches of the Mabinogi*
- Specification of the Fourth Branch, where animal transformation is used as punishment for heinous crimes, as well as symbolism for grief, trauma and escape
- Emphasizes the importance and need for magic in these medieval Welsh stories
