


Psychological Services Clinic Update: Fall 2018 Clinic Census and Preliminary Data

During this semester, the PSC at UNC saw a total of approximately 210 clients. We saw 92 individual and CFT clients pro bono as well as 42 group clients pro bono. Many of these clients were seen for extra credit through agreements with University 101 and other undergraduate instructors/departments. For those clients who were individual adults attending more than a single session and given the OQ.45, the mean reported OQ score at the first session was 58.06 and the mean reported score at end of treatment was 50.57 (with 63 being the cut off for clinic distress). This is an average difference of 7.49 points (with 10 being clinically meaningful).

A total of approximately 1317 sessions were attended. The PSC had an overall attendance rate of approximately 78.9% and a no show rate of approximately 9.1%. The average number of counseling sessions per client was approximately five. At times, the data reported was not complete either from clients (e.g., demographics) or from practica (e.g., estimates for numbers of sessions), so percentages may not always equal 100.


Number of Session per Client






SELF: (Skills, Empathy, Learning, Foundations) Skill-building seminars

Keeping Up With Alumni

Sarah Hoffman graduated in August of 2018, and has since relocated to St. Petersburg, Florida. Currently she is an assistant professor of psychology at Eckerd College, a small liberal arts college on the west coast of Florida. She teaches abnormal psychology, statistics for psychology majors, advanced statistics, and tests and measurement. On a typical day she teaches one or two classes, meets with students, and works on her research in some capacity- planning, writing, and/or analyzing data.

Sarah, what advice do you have for those who may want to pursue similar lines of work as you? If you think you might want to teach but have little or no experience doing so, take every opportunity you can to teach. For example, teaching University 101 is a great chance to try out being a professor. Additionally, academic positions expect that you've presented and published research during your graduate program and have a clear idea of the independent research you'd like to do as a member of the department. Increase your research productivity as much as you can and create a 60-second summary of your proposed research line that will help you to clearly and concisely explain what you plan to do and how you can involve students in your work. A record of securing grant funding is helpful also; apply for public and private funding sources for your dissertation and other projects.

Aaron Wallis graduated in 2015, and stayed in Colorado. He is employed with Open Sky Wilderness Therapy and is a Clinical Therapist for the young adults group. He is lucky because his every day work looks different than most in the profession. At least two days of the week he is sleeping outside, camping out with a group of young adults. While they are out in the wilderness he is running groups, doing consultation and other therapeutic processes. The rest of the week he is making family phone calls to address what people are going back to once leaving the program.

Aaron, in what ways do you think your doctoral program prepared you for your current position? Well, my post-doc helped prepare me to work with the population I work with. Specific to UNC, what they did well was expose us to therapy early on, with a lot of supervision and training. This made me very confident in my skills and ability. In wilderness therapy, you are very visible, as there is no hiding when you are out in the woods with groups and colleagues. So much so that there is an inherently high degree of consultation, and with this, confidence is key.

Any concluding thoughts you might want to add? For those who are not familiar with wilderness therapy, there tends to be a minimalist approach, but the level of clinical complexity should not be underestimated. When it comes to the team of professionals I work with, there is a lot of diversity. I am the only PhD on the team, and there are mostly social workers, LPC's, art therapists, psychiatrist, medical doctor, and a set of medics. Really, we have a team made of so many individuals so that no matter what we face, we can handle it in house. One thing that I was not expecting is the high level of marketing involved.

Blair Nyline



Blair Nyline graduated in 2016, and remained in Colorado. She works as a staff psychologist at the Downtown Denver Jail. The jail contracts for all inmate health services through Denver Health. While she has a general schedule, every day is different and that's what she enjoys most about her work. She is often required to think on her feet to meet the needs of the patients and adapt to the restrictions of the jail setting. Her primary work duty is running the High Acuity Treatment (HAT) unit. It is a unit of 12 beds that houses inmates with severe and persistent mental illnesses that keep them from living within the general population of the jail. She also completes competence evaluations, provides crisis services for inmates, offers training for Denver Sheriff employees, and supervises practicum students.

Blair, what would be your advice for those transitioning from completing the program to job searching? I would encourage students beginning their job search to approach it much in the same way they did the match process. It's helpful to have someone review their applications, be open in what they apply for, and let their personality and passion for the work show during the interview process. I encourage anyone interested in working in forensics to utilize the external practicum process and gain assessment experience. It can be a taxing line of work and it's important to know if you are able to handle it early on. Lastly, I would encourage them to begin practicing good self-care now.

Julie Barritt graduated in August 2017, and relocated to Gainesville, Florida. She is currently a Geropsychologist at the Community Living Center (CLC) within the North Florida/South Georgia Veterans Health System. The CLC consists of 4 units: short-term physical rehab, specialty dementia care (secured unit), long-term care, and hospice/palliative care. At full capacity, they can have about 160 Veterans within their care and there are two Geropsychologists in total that provide the mental health coverage for all units.

Julie, what do you like about your work? I never do the same thing and never know what my day will include, which I prefer over a routine schedule. In general, my week can include the following:


- Participate in goals of care planning with veterans and their families
- Provide neuropsychological evaluations for diagnostic and treatment planning purposes
- Provide long and short term individual therapy
- Develop behavioral plans for Veterans with responsive behaviors related to dementia
- Complete capacity evaluations on Veterans
- Help with developing and coordinating successful discharges in to the community for veterans with neurocognitive disorders with complex psychosocial issues
- Promote culture transformation efforts for the CLC to help make the environment more "home-like" for the veterans. For instance, we have monthly parties for the residents. Everyone's favorite is Halloween where all veterans and staff dress up, and there is an intense costume contest! (My picture is from last year's Halloween party!).
- I sit on the ethics board for the whole hospital and complete ethic consults as they arise

Alumni Spotlight

Dr. Daniel Bruns, a University of Northern Colorado alumnus, finished his PsyD in Counseling Psychology in 1984 and was licensed in 1987. Since then Dr. Bruns has done nothing short of providing outstanding contributions to the field, specifically in health psychology. Former Colorado Governor Bill Owens commended him for the development of the Colorado Chronic Pain Treatment Guidelines in 2001. Further, in 2012 the American Psychological Foundation presented him with the Psychology Fellow award for "...outstanding and unusual contributions to the field of psychology", and in 2016 he was the recipient of a citation from the President of the American Psychological Association for being "the consummate scientist-practitioner." Most recently (2018) the American College of Physicians declared him an "outstanding scientific reviewer."



Dr. Bruns has worn many hats during his career. Currently he is both a Senior Clinical Instructor at the University of Colorado and the Founder/CEO of Health Psychology Associates (HPA) in Greeley. As an instructor he is responsible for mentoring developing physicians with regards to assessment and treatment of patients with chronic pain. HPA encompasses Dr. Daniel Bruns' clinical practice, in which he operates from cognitive behavioral therapy, mindfulness, psycho-educational pain interventions, and biofeedback treatment lens. Outside of these occupations, he serves the field in a variety of capacities, some of which include being a co-chair of the American College of Occupational and Environmental Medicine's (ACOEM) "MDGuidelines" treatment guidelines for anxiety, depression, somatizing and PTSD.

Dr. Bruns has made significant contributions to research as well. His most noteworthy study was a 15-year longitudinal study of 29 million patients suffering from pain and injury, demonstrating that a biopsychosocial treatment approach that integrated psychological interventions could offer better care at less cost. He has also developed standardized psychological tests for pain and injury, otherwise known as the Battery for Health Improvement 2 and Brief Battery for Health Improvement 2, both of which have been published in both English and Spanish. Other publications include studies of presurgical psychological evaluations, the effects of early life sexual assault on chronic pain in adulthood, chronic pain symptoms observed in borderline personalities, and the relationship between physical pain, suicidal ideation, and violent ideation.
