Scholarships Reduce Financial Strain

In our October 2021 issue, we reported that the UNC Center for Urban Education (CUE) was awarded \$850,000 from the Colorado Department of Higher Education's Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative (COSI) Back to Work grant. The majority of that money, which will support the Center over a three-year period, will support students in the form of scholarships.

For spring semester 2022, 80% of our students will be awarded at least \$1,500 toward their tuition and fees. Some of them shared their thoughts about how the scholarship funds will affect them.




