# DIVISION OF DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION

The Division of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DDEI) is active, intentional and forward thinking in our approach to working with students while promoting social mobility. # CÉSAR CHÁVEZ CULTURAL CENTER

The César Chávez Cultural Center provides a home away from home for students across the Latinx diaspora where their social identities, culture, ethnicity, language and traditions are respected and validated through holistic support. We embrace equity and inclusive practices with a student-centered approach and social justice lens.

When you walk into the César Chávez Cultural Center, you walk into your second home. We are staffed by caring professionals and friendly student employees who make the Center a comfortable space for all students. The Center staff embrace a student-centered philosophy that encourages, supports and challenges the UNC Latinx population through intentional programming, services, advocacy and leadership experiences.

Resources for all students include information on campus events, financial literacy workshops, funding sources, introductions to campus advocates and exposure to develop a supportive network of people around students. The Chávez staff is intentional in connecting students to multiple campus resources to maximize their college experience.

Some of the cornerstone annual programs are the Latinx Heritage Kick-Off Celebration, DREAMer Awareness Month and a series of workshops to assist students' needs and ease their concerns.

## POINTS OF PRIDE

The Center partners with Lambda Theta Nu Sorority, Inc. - Kappa Chapter to host the student-led annual Latina Youth Leadership Conference that is now in its 22nd year. This is a collaboration with campus programs, local businesses and surrounding area schools to empower eighth grade students.

The annual LatinXcellence: Sí Se Pudo Graduation is a celebration of accomplishments where Latinx students receive a graduation sarape stole to wear during commencement.

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# UNDOCUMENTED STUDENT SERVICES AND DREAMer ENGAGEMENT PROGRAM (DEP)

Undocumented Student Services and the DEP strives to provide academic, financial and immigration-related resources and support for students with undocumented status. Students who have Temporary Protected Status (TPS), Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) and those with no status are eligible to participate in the DEP.

Located in the César Chávez Cultural Center, Undocumented Students Services aids students as they navigate UNC admissions and throughout their educational experience towards obtaining their college degree. DREAMer students can also receive financial assistance by completing the Colorado Application for State Financial Aid (CASFA). CASFA is open to any student who qualifies for in-state tuition under the Colorado Advancing Students for a Stronger Economy Tomorrow (ASSET) legislation. We help students apply for CASFA and ASSET by hosting workshops or connecting students with financial aid counselors.

The DEP provides support to DREAMers during their time at UNC and it has a focus on their first-year experience. During the summer, students within the DEP participate in a two-day orientation where they begin to create community with one another and learn about available on-campus resources and how to access them. Students are also paired with a mentor who has previously gone through the DEP. The mentor is to become the first point of contact for their mentee. Throughout the academic school year, members of the DEP are given the opportunity for professional and personal growth. Community building aspects are integrated through the program where cohorts bond through various activities and events to strengthen their relationships.

## POINTS OF PRIDE

DREAMer Zone increases attendees knowledge of terminology and policy affecting DREAMers and their families and build awareness around experiences of DREAMers.

DEP annually collaborates with campus and community partners to host a series of educational events surrounding the resiliency of DREAMers or persons with an undocumented status in the US during DREAMer Awareness Month.

Other types of support include our DREAMer and DACA scholarships, which both support undocumented students in their pursuit of a college education by providing funding for academic related expenses or to renew their DACA status on a case-to-case basis.

# MARCUS GARVEY CULTURAL CENTER

The MGCC provides a place of emotional safety, which includes favorable conditions and opportunities, in order to support holistic growth and development, for Black Diasporic students.

The MGCC, also known as The Garvey, advocates for and expands awareness and appreciation for the rich cultural and intellectual heritage across the African diaspora through programming, support and relationship building. The primary aim of the leadership is to understand and nurture the whole student, with particular attention to their connectedness through cultural, social, wellness programs and events.

The Garvey is a place where students can be themselves while enjoying all of the spaces created just for them. The staff also plan events like the Soul Food Night during Black Heritage Month, the Black Arts Festival, which celebrates and centers Black creatives in Colorado, and the Black Excellence Celebration, which honors graduating students and recognizes the Center's greatest supporters.

When you think of your college experience, know that the Garvey is your home, and here, you can create the experiences you need to succeed. We look forward to you enjoying your academic home.

## POINTS OF PRIDE

The Black Excellence Graduation Celebration recognizes graduate and undergraduate students with a formal program and reception.

In February, the MGCC celebrates Black Heritage Month, honoring the contributions, achievements and voices of those within the African diaspora.

Meet the Greeks: Divine 9 Yard Show brings together historically Black fraternities and sororities, as well as the Multicultural Greek Council's fraternities and sororities, to educate attendees about their organizations and display their stepping and strolling talents.

Our mission is to advocate for, educate with, and support all identities across the gender, sexual and romantic spectrums through an intersectional lens. We build an equitable and inclusive culture of care on our campus in order to have a positive impact on the career readiness, graduation rates and holistic success of UNC students.

Advocate. Educate. Support. That's the mission of the Gender and Sexuality Resource Center (GSRC), and it shows in everything the GSRC does. The GSRC advocates with those who hold marginalized sexual and gender identities, educates the campus community on issues related to gender and sexuality, and, most importantly, provides support to student, faculty and staff by fostering community and connecting individuals with resources and programs.

In addition, the Center holds events for Coming Out Week, Bisexuality Awareness Day, Transgender Day of Remembrance, World AIDS Day, ACE Awareness Week, Transgender Week of Visibility and many more. The GSRC strives to encourage respectful discussion, personal reflection and academic development related to issues of gender, sexuality and intersectional identities.

## POINTS OF PRIDE

The GSRC hosts 15 different affinity groups where individuals can meet up around specific identities and interests to find community.

The GSRC hosts a mentoring program to connect students with a faculty or staff mentor on campus.

The GSRC celebrates LGBTQ+ History Month in October every year. Activities include educational workshops, community activities and an annual drag show!

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# VETERANS SERVICES

Our mission is to empower military affiliated students by providing superb student-centered service, practical and appropriate resources and an inclusive community of support.

Veterans Services exists to provide a supportive network and resources to all military-affiliated students, including those on Active Duty, Reserve or Guard and their family members. Veterans Services provides UNC's more than 500 military-affiliated students with events like a Military Dinner and a Military Challenge. Roudebush Cottage offers a place for military-affiliated students to connect with other students who can relate to the contrast between the military and civilian mindset in the classroom. Whether students are hanging out with their kids in the cottage or showing up for advice on filing GI Bill paperwork, Veterans Services is committed to helping them reach their goals and thrive at UNC.

Finally, Veterans Services works with faculty and provides training to give the campus community perspective on the military experience, and create a climate of support for veterans and their families.

## POINTS OF PRIDE

Veterans Services partners with the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment to connect veterans with jobs, and with the VA VITAL program to get students on-campus assistance with medical and disability benefits and mental health resources.

Student Veterans of America (SVA) and the SALUTE Veterans National Honor Society are both active on UNC's campus.

Since 2013, UNC has been designated annually as a Military Friendly® School, and has been awarded "Gold" status for both the 2019 and 2020 academic years.

UNC is a partner campus in the Peer Advisors for Veteran Education (PAVE) network, a support for new student veterans through peer support to ensure personal and academic success.

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# NATIVE AMERICAN STUDENT SERVICES

NASS aims to promote academic and leadership excellence of Native American students at UNC. NASS seeks to enrich the UNC community through academic, social and cultural programs that reflect the tradition, heritage and history of Native America.

Art. Politics. Advocacy. All are brought together through NASS. In addition to providing support for and recruiting Native American students, NASS works to correct the stereotype that Native peoples are ancient and highlight the vibrancy and resiliency of these modern indigenous communities.

To accomplish that purpose, as well as to connect students with opportunities that interest them, NASS host an Indigenous Guest Lecture Series. Visual artists, musical artists and other speakers and activists visit campus to address timely topics. Previous guest lecturers have included activist, Dr. Adrienne Keene, artists Gregg Deal and Rose Simpson; photographer, Matika Wilbur; musical artists Tall Paul, Mic Jordan and Frank Waln; 3-Time U.S. Poet Laureate Joy Harjo; and most recently, NASA Engineer, Aaron Yazzie. This past Fall semester, Aaron encouraged students of color majoring in STEM to push through tough obstacles they face while navigating higher education.

Community. Belonging. These two words are accomplished through the NASS mentoring program. Through the program, there are several opportunities for students to network, build relationships and identify personal goals and aspirations that will contribute to a successful college experience at UNC.

## POINTS OF PRIDE

In Fall 2021, NASS hosted a guest lecture by Aaron Yazzie, Diné, mechanical engineer at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory. Aaron shared his work designing mechanical systems for NASA's robotic space research mission to Mars, specifically the successful launch of the Perseverance rover. Aaron shared his personal narrative to model and emphasize the importance of culture, family and community aided his academic and professional success.

The NASS Mentoring Program helps first year Native college students to transition smoothly to postsecondary education. Through this program, students have mentoring socials to focus on growth through goal setting and building connections with their Native peers.

Every Spring Semester, APASS recognizes the Lunar New Year traditions from across the Asian and Pacific Islander diaspora featuring Lion Dance performances, traditional cultural foods and a children's carnival.

In collaboration with the student organization, Ha'aheo 'O Hawai'i Club, the annual Lū'au is hosted on-campus. In previous years, this event showcases the vibrant and resilient Pacific Islander foods and cultures of Hawai'i including student performances from UNC's Halau Hula 'O Ha'aheo and a live performance from Honolulu's island reggae band, The City Boys.

# CENTER FOR WOMEN'S AND GENDER EQUITY

The CWGE honors gender as a central identity and engages critical women's and gender issues, while challenging systems of inequity and advocating for change at UNC.

We envision a campus and world where systemic oppression and structural inequities no longer have a place at UNC. We accomplish this by: educating our campus community on topics and issues related to the experiences of women, trans and non-binary students; providing an inclusive and validating space; engaging in conversations about the impacts of sexism, cissexism and misogyny; and empowering student voices to advocate for and create gender equity at UNC.

The CWGE proudly offers a variety of resources that students can access for free. These free resources include pregnancy tests, contraceptive barriers and menstruation products. The staff at the CWGE are excited to establish connections and offer support, so please stop in and get connected to the best resources related to women's and gender issues.

## POINTS OF PRIDE

As of January 2022, the CWGE has distributed 189 free bulk order menstruation packs to UNC students through Project M.E. (Menstrual Equity). As of October 2021, all coin operated menstrual product dispensers in academic buildings have been converted to offer students FREE products for emergency situations.

The CWGE along with the Department of Nutrition and Dietetics has established 12 lactation stations throughout UNC's campus and distance locations for individuals to breastfeed/chestfeed or express their milk, and the number of lactation stations continues to grow! In addition, we have also established a Lactation Support Policy for all members of our UNC community.

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# STRYKER INSTITUTE FOR LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

The Stryker Institute for Leadership Development is a participation-based scholarship program that serves women from under-represented groups and supports scholars in their identity and leadership development.

The Stryker Institute provides access to educational opportunities focused on identity development, social justice, leadership and mentorship. We cultivate a sense of belonging through connectedness and community, empower women through encouragement and facilitation of personal growth and establish a network of support through collaboration with campus and community partners. Our program prepares students to develop a leadership identity that enables them to create positive social change and advocate with purpose.

We welcome students interested in learning more about scholarship eligibility and our program experience, to stop in and meet with our staff. Through the generous gift from our donor, Ronda Stryker, the Stryker Institute has been able to serve and support over 476 scholars at UNC for almost 20 years. Joining the Stryker Institute provides a space for students who identify as women to join a community where all students sharing a common identity can grow and develop together in their awareness of self, understanding that each of our unique identities and experiences shapes the leaders we become.

81% of students served by the Stryker Institute graduate within three years of entering the program; 94% graduate within four years of entering the program.

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# COLORADO OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIP INITIATIVE

COSI seeks to offer tuition assistance and wrap around student support services to ensure that every Colorado student has affordable access to postsecondary education and support services to complete a degree or certificate in their desired career and enter into Colorado's workforce.

The UNC COSI Scholars Program is a student support program coupled with a scholarship to help UNC students finish a degree and leave college with no debt. Since the beginning, in August of 2020, COSI has supported over 400 students and is currently working on their seventh grant to support another 125. COSI is designed for students to get connected to campus and receive academic and wrap around support services.

COSI is a place where students feel welcomed, accepted, and most of all, supported in all areas of the student experience! We hope all COSI students have a great experience here at UNC and we are here for your overall success!

## POINTS OF PRIDE

Some of the most exciting and popular parts of the program are the food events and snack distribution! COSI staff make it part of their daily work to make sure students never go hungry and are either hosting a meal or taking students to the dining halls. It is a time of bonding, conversation and a sense of family.

Providing life skills workshops to students such as freshman first-year seminar, financial literacy, time management, test anxiety, self-care and much more.

# UPWARD BOUND

Upward Bound provides fundamental support to participants in their preparation for college entrance. The program provides opportunities for participants to succeed in their pre-college performance and ultimately in their higher education pursuits. The goal of Upward Bound is to increase the rate at which participants complete secondary education and enroll in and graduate from institutions of postsecondary education.

The UNC Upward Bound Program is funded to serve 63 high school students who are recruited as freshman, sophomores, or juniors. As determined by the grant proposal, qualifying students must attend the target Greeley schools, Central, Northridge, or West. The UNC program is very diverse ethnically and racially, giving students the opportunity to interact with and learn about many different peoples and cultures.

Upward Bound, the oldest of all the TRIO programs, is a highly successful, college preparatory program of rigorous academic instruction, individual tutoring and counseling for potential-first-generation college graduate or low-income students.

The original three TRIO programs were spawned by the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. Upward Bound was the first of the three to be funded.

## POINTS OF PRIDE

100% Rate of high school retention and graduation

77% High school graduation rate with GPA of 2.5 or higher

74% Completed rigorous college prep high school curriculum

89% of Participants are First-Generation and Low-Income
