

# FY 2025 Endowment Market Value by Purpose (\$131.3 million)

For fiscal year 2024-25 the Foundation's long-term focused investment pool generated a net gain of approximately 11.7%.



### Who does this scholarship support?

This scholarship is awarded to a non-traditional student (25 years old or older), who demonstrates financial need and who has dependents.

#### **Established at UNC:**

Over the past 35 years, this renewable scholarship has

made a lasting impact by funding seventeen students through their entire college journey at UNC.

#### **Scholarship Story:**

Marie Hicks '41, '47, discovered her passion for teaching in a rural Kansas one-room school in the early 1900s. While at Colorado State Teachers College, now the University of Northern Colorado, she met and married Charles Albert Diggs, then left school to support his new career in education.

Following his passing in 1939, Marie, at 44, returned to Greeley with her two children to finish her degree. Specializing in guidance counseling, she earned her master's degree in 1947. Marie became a respected teacher, counselor and community leader in Coffeyville, Kansas. She inspired countless students and actively contributed to civic and cultural life, leaving a legacy of dedication, resilience and transformative influence.



## Dr. Frank J. Lucero Bright Futures **Memorial Scholarship Endowment**



### Who does this scholarship support?

This scholarship is awarded to a first-generation student who is studying education, intending to become a teacher and is engaged in supporting and contributing to the enrichment of diversity across campus through leadership and volunteerism.

### **Established at UNC:**

This scholarship was established in 2023. Since its establishment, this renewable scholarship has been awarded to two students.

### **Scholarship Story:**

Dr. Frank J. Lucero '74, '77

Dr. Frank Lucero '74, '77, a first-generation student from Monte Vista, Colorado, earned his degree in social science and secondary education. After teaching high school in his hometown, he aspired to become a principal and returned to UNC to earn his master's in educational administration in 1977 followed by a Ph.D. from Colorado State University in 1985.

Lucero was founding director of the Hispanic Cultural Center, now the César Chávez Cultural Center at UNC. He was also Assistant Dean of Students for Cultural Diversity for six years. Later, he returned to K-12 education leadership.

After retiring, he became Executive Director of Laradon Hall, a Denver nonprofit for people with developmental disabilities. Lucero dedicated his career to serving others through his abiding love for students.



### **Scholarship Story:**

Anna C. Petteys '43, '52

In 1943 at the age of 51, Anna C. Petteys earned her master's degree from Colorado State College of Education, now the University of Northern Colorado, and had a long career as lecturer, politician, journalist and author. She was appointed to the CSCE Board of Trustees in 1945 and became the first woman elected to the Colorado Board of Education where she served 18 years, four as chairman.

A strong supporter of education, Petteys was active in the United Nations and traveled extensively. Her scholarship has supported many UNC students around the globe.
