Course Registration	<ul> <li>Students register depending on admission date and priority registration dates from the Registrar's office (the same time as students with Junior class standing). Standard Credit Load	<ul> <li>To maintain visa status, undergraduate students must be enrolled in at least 12 credits per semester.</li> <li>Most courses are 3 credits, which usually means 3 hours/week in the classroom. 4-5 courses per semester is the typical course load (12 to 15 credits).</li> </ul>
Restrictions	<ul> <li>Exchange students cannot take online classes because they do not count for J-1 visa or immigration purposes and are not included in exchange agreements.</li> <li>Exchange students can only take undergraduate courses (numbered 100–499) on the Greeley campus.</li> <li>Exchange students are admitted to the university, not a specific college or department. This allows them to take courses in different subjects and experience U.S. education.</li> <li>Some courses have restrictions or prerequisites. Students may request approval from the instructor or department to join a restricted course.</li> <li>Each semester, UNC offers University 101, a 3-credit, interactive course designed to help students adjust to college life. It is strongly recommended.</li> </ul>
Grading Scale	UNC works on a 4.0 grade point system. A-F grades are assigned where:  • A (4.0) is above average, • B (3.0) is average, • C (2.0) is below average, • D (1.0) is below average but still passing, and • F (0.0) is failing.  Grade point averages are calculated by multiplying the credit hours for each course by the grade point value of the grade; totaling credit hours and grade points; and then dividing the grade points by the credit hours.

	Accommodations
University Housing	<ul> <li>On Campus Housing: www.unco.edu/housing/ reserve housing as soon as possible after admission to UNC. A refundable \$100 deposit is required to reserve an on-campus room/apartment and must be paid directly by the admitted student. Residence halls may be closed during the break between semesters. Please contact Housing for additional information about housing arrangements during university holidays and breaks.</li> <li>Important: Students living in residence halls must enroll in a university meal plan. Students in an off-campus house or apartment may choose whether or not to purchase a meal plan.</li> <li>Students in campus housing can be provided with basic bed linens on arrival from Housing, that are on loan for the first week (and can be rented for the semester thereafter).</li> </ul>
Off-Campus Housing	Due to limited public transportation in Greeley, we recommend that students live in on-campus accommodations. UNC does not

provide a service to assist students in finding and securing off- campus accommodations. Students wishing to live off-campus are encouraged to consider distance from campus and grocery stores, whether the apartment is furnished and to carefully check
all reviews. Lease contracts, once signed, are binding.

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	Transportation
Airport Transportation	<ul> <li>We recommend flying to <u>Denver International Airport</u> (called DIA, locally, but which has an official designation as DEN), which is the nearest major airport and nearest international airport. UNC is just about an hour from DIA.</li> <li>There is no regular shuttle transportation between Denver airport and Greeley at this time. Local Transportation	<ul> <li>transportation/to-and-from/</li> <li>UNC students have free transportation locally through the Greeley Area Transportation (GET) bus system, however, it is somewhat limited in scope.</li> <li>ISSS organizes shopping trips during arrival week to help students make necessary purchases for linens, personal items, clothes, groceries, etc. Students wishing to participate in these shopping trips sign up directly with OGE.</li> </ul>
	Student Support Services
International Student and Scholar Services (ISSS)  Cross-Cultural Events	The ISSS team provides support with cultural adjustment, academic and professional growth, and immigration services.  International Student and Scholar Services organizes cross-cultural events and excursions throughout each term to promote and support cultural engagement opportunities.
Global Buddies	ISSS also organizes the Global Buddies program, to create a mutual learning opportunity between Americans and international students. Buddies help international students adjust to living in the United States through support and friendship.
International Exchange Store	The ISSS International Exchange Store has some necessary items like sheets, blankets, and hangers that are available free of charge, on a first come, first served basis (and we are happy to receive any donated items at the end of a student's stay).
Campus Support	Exchange students have access to a full range of other <u>campus support</u> and recreation services, including the <u>Disability Resource Center</u> (documentation of disability in English required), <u>Recreation Center</u> , <u>Cultural and Identity Resource Centers</u> , <u>Tutoring Center</u> , <u>Writing Center</u> , <u>Library Services, clubs and organizations</u> , <u>club sports</u> , and <u>Outdoor Pursuits</u> .
Employment and	Tax Requirements for J-1 Exchange Students
Employment in the US	<ul> <li>J-1 Exchange Visitors are only permitted to work with specific authorization. On-campus employment is allowed with advance approval from ISSS and is limited to 20 hours per week during active study. Students can search job postings through the Center for Career Readiness and apply to ISSS for authorization.</li> <li>With home institution and UNC department support, exchange students may also qualify for Academic Training (AT), which allows paid or unpaid work directly related to their major. AT is academic in nature, with employment as a secondary component.</li> </ul>
Tax	<ul> <li>J-1 exchange visitors are required to complete tax forms for the period of stay in the U.S, regardless of income in the U.S.</li> <li>ISSS provides access to tax form preparation software for exchange students in the spring (February – June) for anyone who took classes at UNC during the preceding calendar year.</li> <li>Access</li> </ul>
