COURSE: Art 508 Italy Study Abroad Italy: Early Italian Renaissance Art History.

DESCRIPTION: Art historical study of painting, sculpture and architecture from the 13th-15th centuries in

Tuscany.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course is designed to 1) give the student an overview of the relationship of art to religious, political, cultural and philosophical developments and expressions of the early Italian Renaissance, 2) develop a stylistic understanding of art as it relates to chronological developments, and 3) develop skills in critical thinking and analysis. Course content will focus on early stylistic, philosophical, conceptual and technological

developments within the cultural centers of Florence, Siena, Assisi, and Arezzo.

Attention will be directed to the art of major artists---Duccio, Giotto, Cimabue, Pietro and Ambrogio Lorenzetti, Simone Martini, Ghiberti, Brunelleschi, Masaccio, Donatello,

Piero della Francesca, Botticelli, Alberti, Fra Angelico, Fra Filippo Lippi, Uccello,

Michelozzo, and Luca della Robbia.

METHODS OF EVALUATION:

1. Test: At the end of pre-session, students will be given a general knowledge test based on the text and lectures.

- 2. Journal: In Italy, students will be required to keep a journal of daily observations related to their cultural and academic experiences with questions and ideas related to class topics. This will allow each student to develop concepts and a written individual dialogue of the course focus as it relates to their knowledge base and experiences.
- 3. Essay: Students will be given an essay question dealing with a series of underlying themes, technological advancements and concepts related to the artists/their works and sites studies and visited during the course. Their response will be accumulative over the three week time period in Italy. The completed essay will be due the last day of the course. In addition to class lectures, journals, field trips, text and readings, the students will have access to an extensive art reference library at Italart, Santa Chiara Study Center in Castiglion Fiorentino.
- 4. A second paper assignment is a formal research paper on a topic related to each individual student's field of graduate study as it relates to the art and culture of the Early Italian Renaissance. For example if you are a painting or art history major you might choose a related ceramic topic or if you are a teacher you might develop a lesson plan based on your experiences in Italy. A preliminary topic must be cleared by me prior to your departure from Italy. The paper will be due June 25th, 2019. - 5. Grading: Final course grades will be determined according to the following: (Pre-session Exam 20% Italy Essay 40% Second paper assignment 10% Journal 20% Attendance/participation 10%
