■ The Visitors Center is home to the UNC Office of Admissions and is a great place to start your tour. It was formerly the UNC President's Residence, but it was converted in 1999 to be a place for prospective students to learn about UNC and attend admissions events and tours.

This former library is presently dedicated to administrative offices such as the Graduate School, The Office of Financial Aid, the Registrar and International Admissions. Outside the west doors sits the cornerstone of Cranford Hall, the first UNC building, constructed in 1890.

Gunter Hall 3F

Gunter Hall was originally designed to be UNC's athletics building. However, this iconic structure is a hive of academic activity during the school year. Most of the Natural and Health Sciences programs. including Sport and Exercise Science, Nursing and Speech Language Pathology, all assemble here to learn about and advance understanding of the human condition. The bell tower tolls every quarter hour, ensuring that nappers on the green make it to class on time.

Frasier Hall and Skinner Music Library 1-2F

Skinner Music Library has more than 100,000 music scores as well as books and periodicals on its shelves. Frasier Hall is UNC's own labyrinth of music and theatre arts classrooms and performance spaces.

Garden Theatre 3F UNC's outdoor stage hosts many events each year, including concerts, dancing, and gatherings.

Grav Hall 3G

Parking Services, the UNC Police Department and Norton Theatre are the primary occupants of Gray Hall today. Gray Hall was once home to a pub called the Bru-Inn. Norton Theatre now fills that space and hosts the Little Theatre of the Rockies.

Kepner Hall 2G

This unique red brick building used to be a K-12 school in the 1920's. Now renovated, the prestigious Monfort College of Business fills its halls. It is the first and only business school to receive the Malcolm Baldridge National Quality Award from the Office of the President of the United States and is also accredited by the AACSB in

accounting and business administration. Many of the classrooms are equipped with SMART technology and there is also a Coffee Corner in the lower level.

Guggenheim and Crabbe Hall

These sister buildings are creation spaces for many Visual Arts majors at UNC. There are two recently renovated dance studios located in Crabbe for Performing Arts students. Guggenheim and Crabbe are long-standing testaments of UNC's devotion to the arts on

Roudebush Cottage 3G

Veterans Services occupies the Roudebush cottage. Resources for veteran and military-affiliated students, advising for those under the GI Bill, and the headquarters for the Student Veterans of America UNC affiliate are a part of Veterans Services.

Photographers, sculptors, jewelry makers and ceramists all have the opportunity to be creative in this space. This building is a haven for Visual Arts students complete with a 20 station digital darkroom and two SMART classrooms.

Central Campus Housing 5F La Central campus is known for its beauty, green spaces and charm. The residence halls here accommodate more than one thousand students and provide close access to Tobey-Kendel Dining Hall and



Ben Nighthorse Campbell Center 4F

University of Northern Colorado Cancer Rehabilitation Institute (UNCCRI) mission is to relieve suffering, promote self-sufficiency, and eliminate secondary cancers and recurrences to improve the quality of life of cancer survivors through prescriptive exercise and nutrition education. UNCCRI, housed in the Ben Nighthorse Campbell Center, is recognized nationally as a leading facility in cancer rehabilitation.

13 Tobey-Kendel Hall 5F Tobey-Kendel, known simply as T-K to students, is one of three dining locations on campus. The offices of Housing and Residential Education and Dining Services are also located here and are happy to answer questions about living and eating at UNC.

Kohl and Davis Houses 6F These two houses are multicultural centers. Each has its own lounge and study areas. The Marcus Garvey Center for Black Cultural Education is in the Davis House and both the Asian/Pacific American Student Services (A/PASS) and Native American Student Services (NASS) are located in the Kohl House as well as a resource library and computer lab.

■ Candelaria Hall 70 Candelaria Hall is filled to the brim

with culture by the College of Humanities and Social Sciences. Many of UNC's language labs and computer stations are here and Bears News also operates out of Candelaria, where they broadcast on the radio as well as on the UNC website.

20 César Chávez Cultural Center 68

Located in the Patton House, the César Chávez Cultural Center can help you connect with other students, learn about UNC resources and find out about Latino and Latina organizations on campus.

■ ■ Butler Hancock Sports Pavilion and Bank of Colorado Arena 8B

With its seating capacity of 3,000, intercollegiate athletics, concerts, and philanthropic events are all hosted in Butler Hancock. The building includes a field house, training facility and athletics offices.



■ McKee Hall 7D Primarily, McKee Hall is known for

being the core of the teacher education institute here at UNC, but actually many programs collaborate here including the Psychology and Philosophy departments.

Michener Library 7C
Our library is named for renowned

UNC alumnus and Pulitzer Prize winning author James A. Michener. Michener is the largest building on campus, with 17 miles of full bookshelves and countless study spaces. It also offers students many services such as Academic Support and Advising, Disability Support Services and the Center for Honors, Scholars and Leadership.

Nottingham and the Southwest Fields 7-8A

Nottingham field is our football arena that can hold up to 8.500 fans at each home game. To the south of Nottingham you will find a series of practice fields used by UNC's athletic organizations.

■ Campus Recreation Center 90 The Rec Center is equipped with numerous training facilities including a thirtyone foot climbing wall, strength training and cardio equipment and numerous gyms and fitness rooms. They offer a wide variety of classes to students, faculty and staff and there are many ways to get involved and stay healthy. Campus Rec also offers rental gear through the Outdoor Pursuits program, located in Harrison
