The new focus is designed to expand your knowledge of language, literature and related fields, preparing you to develop an English curriculum that meets the needs of all middle and

high school students. The course of study introduces new teaching skills, theories and strategies. It also prepares you to engage in authentic, classroom-based research. This program will enrich your teaching and your students' learning and open up new opportunities for leadership in your school and the profession.

Career Pathway

UNC's English Education Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) Program will enhance your skills in the 7-12 classroom and prepare you to teach at the community college level. In addition, graduates of the program are qualified to teach dual/concurrent enrollment classes.
