If you speak a language other than English, have already earned a bachelor's degree and have considered becoming a classroom world language teacher, UNC has a program to help you realize your dream. The M.A. in Multilingual Education, World Languages Licensure emphasis prepares students with advanced knowledge, skills and cross-cultural competencies to work in the field of second/world language education in both American K-12 systems and international settings to advance multilingual education. Graduates of the program will receive a master's degree and a Colorado world language teaching license. Certain prior coursework may qualify for transfer and reduction of total required credits.

Career Pathway

Our master's program will give you the skills, knowledge and confidence to develop a successful career in language education.

Graduates will be prepared to become teachers and administrators in K-12 schools in the United States and in other countries. This program will also successfully prepare students for doctoral studies.

Degree Options

Students can focus their studies in Chinese, Spanish, French, German or Japanese. Students can also tailor their program to meet their individual needs by choosing between a mixture of online and evening classes offered on the Greeley campus, or by taking the program completely online.
