## **Greetings From the Executive Director**

This year brought structural changes to the UNC Honors Program with the creation of a new Division for Undergraduate Academic Engagement which is housed within Academic Affairs. Honors is now part of this more comprehensive unit that serves students who are intellectually curious, motivated and want to engage at a deeper and more connected level with their academics at UNC. The unit coordinates the Honors Program, Office of Undergraduate Research, McNair Scholars Program, Interdisciplinary Studies Student Designed BA, and supports ROTC, as well as providing guidance for students interested in nationally competitive scholarships and fellowships..

Meeting our goals to provide a strong faculty connection between the programs and the students, UNC was able to redesign a previously funded position and hired the first Schulze Chair for Honors & Interdisciplinary Studies, Corinne Wieben. Dr. Wieben will begin teaching our junior and senior Honors Thesis courses next Fall and is working with the Faculty Advisory Council this semester updating the curriculum for Honors.

This year, through the Division, we helped several students reach their goals, including Shukuru Rushanika who was selected to present his research at the competitive Posters on the Hill event, which seeks to connect talented undergraduate student researchers with U.S. Congress members in Washington D.C. which was virtual this year.

Not virtually, two of our honors students, Dani Magasano and Karissa Terry, were fortunate to be able to travel to Orlando, Florida, to participate in the live National Collegiate Honors Conference. Their research posters were both selected for the competitive student poster competition at the conference, and they brought back new ideas for student engagement in honors!

The Honors Program currently served 219 students this year, with 75% in our Honors Interdisciplinary Program and 25% in the Upper Division Program. We have high graduation rates - 77% of our students graduate in 6 years and 55% in 4 years. Additionally, we are a close match to UNC's ethnic diversity with about 20% Hispanic, 26% of our honors students are first generation. You have a chance to read about some of our students who are graduates this year, These are students who continued on the honors path, even as they navigated online learning, masks, and the instability of the pandemic.

#### Honors Interdisciplinary Program – Connecting ideas

Honors Interdisciplinary Program students develop and explore personalized themes of intellectual development through their honors curriculum. They graduate with honors if they complete 11 credit hours of self-designed, integrative curriculum and create a portfolio reflecting on their theme and their learning experiences.

#### Upper Division Honors – Student-driven, inquiry-based learning

Upper Division Honors Program supports students progressing toward their goal of producing an honors thesis or creative capstone project. These students graduate with honors when they complete a significant faculty mentored honors thesis/capstone either in their selected discipline or as an interdisciplinary project.

# **Office of Undergraduate Research**

The Office of Undergraduate Research (OUR) provides support and recognition for undergraduate student research and creative endeavors for all colleges at the University of Northern Colorado, furthering the University's goals for active learning, creativity, and original research. Each semester the Office of Undergraduate Research offers research and creative endeavor stipends and support grants towards undergraduate scholarship. UNC students are able to apply for funds, which can be used for research supplies, travel, conference presentations or performances, professional development and general support.

#### Fall Awards

This fall the Office of Undergraduate Research awarded \$14,475 in stipends, supplies, and conference participation fees to the following 18 students. These students represented 11 different majors and every College on campus including University Libraries.

## Eugene D. and Peggy J. Koplitz Scholarship

Dr. Koplitz, Professor Emeritus of Educational Psychology, came to UNC in 1958 and studied mental processes of advanced intellects. Because of his experience in gifted education, the task of establishing an Honors program was given to Koplitz. In only a yearand-a half, Koplitz established the UNC Honors Program with partnership in 19 departments on campus as well as establishing the Honors thesis tradition that still stands to thisday as one of the more rigorous

Honors thesis requirements in the State. As founder of the UNC's Honors Program, Gene Koplitz began a tradition that centered on the intellectual development of many of the University's top students. Throughout his professional career, Dr. Koplitz presented research papers at international, regional, state, and local levels, and he made a large impact on all he met and taught. Sadly, Gene passed away in early September 2017, and is survived by his wife, Peggy, his children David and Stephanie, and five grandchildren.

Edgerton Memorial Honors Scholarship. Dr. Edgerton was Director of the Honors Program from 1985 to 2000. Becky Edgerton (April 22, 1941-December 17, 1999) loved poetry, opera and good movies; The New York Times Book Review and The New Yorker magazine, good literature, wine and conversation; feminist theory, loyal friends and her family. For her, reading was a way of life, and she read just about everything. She published poetry, taught in the Honors and Life of the Mind programs.

## Marie Livingston Honors Scholarship



Dr. Marie Leigh Livingston is Professor Emerita of Economics at University of Northern Colorado. She came to Colorado in 1979 to work for the Economic Research Service, U.S.D.A. and began her career at UNC in 1985 after earning her Ph.D. While at UNC, she was Professor and Chair of Economics, and served as Director of several Vietnam interdisciplinary programs, including the University Honors Program, International Trade and Relations (now International Affairs) and the Life of the Mind Program. With specializations in water resources and international economics, she worked extensively in Central Europe and has been a visiting professor at University of Minnesota, University of Frankfurt and University of Madrid. In 2009 she was a Fulbright Senior Specialist at the University of Economics in Prague. Since retiring from UNC, her most recent international experience has been to teach at Foreign Trade University in Hanoi.

As recipients of a variety of grants and scholarships over the course of their academic careers, Greg and Kaye hoped to support other first generation students through the establishment of the Gregory E. and Debra K. Holman Scholarship. In directing their support towards honors students, the Holmans recognized the students Kaye had worked with in her time at UNC were students like the Holmans themselves, who had a passion and a commitment to academic excellence and the capacity and drive to serve others and the natural world.









## Barbara Heidger Memorial Scholarship

Barbara Jane Heidger (Hyslop) entered UNC (then Colorado State College) as a member of the newly inaugurated Honors Program, then under the direction of Professor Eugene Koplitz. There she met fellow Honors student Paul Heidger, who she later married. Barbara's academic excellence and devotion to her field (international relations) led her to work abroad with Columbia's Teachers for East Africa during the completion of her Master's coursework. She taught at a residential boy's secondary school in Kericho, Kenya

for two years, teaching world history and researching the development of political parties, which had just begun in Kenya in 1964 after emerging from British colonial rule. She continued to be involved with the local and international community, sponsoring the Model UN Program and assuming a leadership position in her church's efforts to welcome and resettle refugee families from Southeast Asia. It is sincerely hoped that this scholarship bearing Barbara's name may assist students at UNC to reach their life goals and full potential. Barbara passed in 1994, and is survived by Paul and their two daughters, Julie and Lisa.
