Center for Honors, Scholars, and Leadership: 2019-2020 A Year in Review

Greetings from the Honors Director

We are not finishing up with the momentous year of 2020 as we all thought we would, finding ourselves dealing with added dimensions of a pandemic and shut-down of the University! My daughter is graduating high school this year, Class of 2020, and so I have been acutely aware of the disappointment for those who were to have these kinds of culminating experiences. This publication is our end of year wrap-up, which has traditionally been provided during the Annual Awards Banquet, where we celebrate our seniors graduating and our scholarship recipients. I am quite sad that the distribution this year is so much more impersonal, via email and social media channels. On the other hand, I am glad that at least we have this avenue to recognize the achievement and successes of our Honors students.

A few thoughts about what I have seen during the second half of Spring semester, when our University went on shut down, like the rest of the world:

- Our students are amazingly resilient and withstood the impact of the switch to online instruction that for most students included conditions that were less than ideal for learning. I know of many who moved back home with younger siblings, anxious family members and general fear. And yet, they persisted in continuing to complete their work, communicating on a regular basis, joining zoom calls, submitting research project progress, switching from one plan for their work for the semester to another plan.

- All of the Honors juniors who began their thesis work this semester completed a proposal with project design and at least a preliminary literature review. ALL of these students continued to plunge forward, and even in the isolation of their remote work environments, wrote strong proposals with meaningful topics.

- Students in Honors Interdisciplinary Program created on-line portfolios and adapted their course by contract projects to fit with the new scenarios.

- Students in study abroad programs managed the chaos of conflicting information coming from the U.S. and the countries where they were housed to find their way back home.

- 75 incoming freshmen have accepted their space in Honors Program and at UNC, a 30% increase over this time last year! Although incoming freshmen are unsure about what the world will bring, they are finding UNC's messages as reassuring.

Our graduates again represent a diverse group of dedicated, innovative, and passionate individuals who have pursued their own individual interests, developed their own themes for exploration, and created projects that are both personally meaningful and significant to their disciplines. The Honors Program served 251 students this year from all Colleges on campus. This number is an increase of 3% over the previous year, which was a 35% increase from the year before that. The programs statistics provide a snapshot of its numeric impact, with a 94% freshmen retention rate from Fall to Fall, and a 6-year graduation from UNC rate for students who participated in Honors at 78%, exceeding the University average. However, the Honors Program continues to focus on individual student success that looks different for each of our students from their diverse backgrounds. No matter what their background, our students, continue to impress the world with their commitment to the public good. The student's highlights are included in this end of year snapshot.

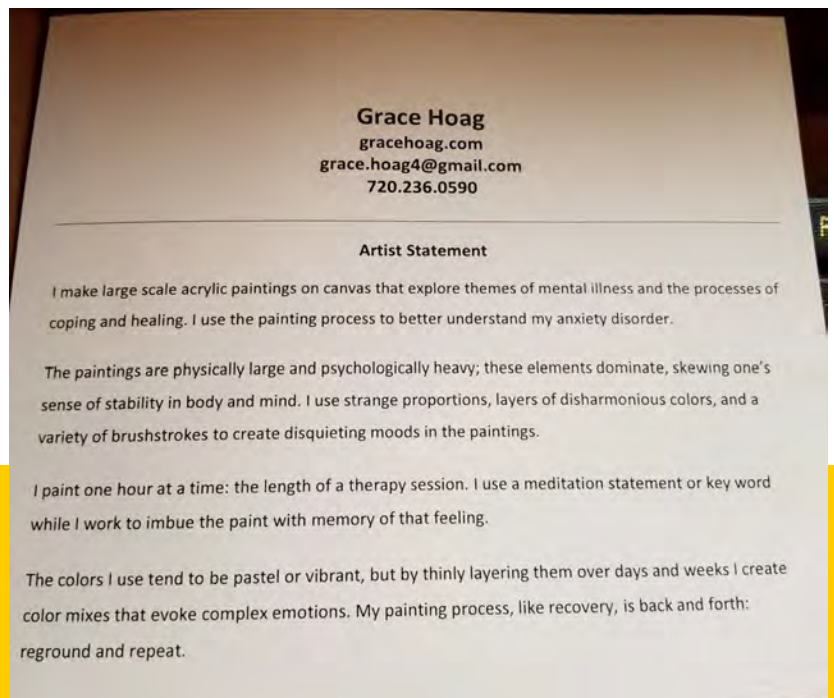


An IDEA from Adam Zhao:

As part of the re-orientation of the Honors program towards becoming more **holistic and inclusive**, we have been at work developing the **Inclusivity, Diversity, and Equity Advancement (IDEA) initiative**. The goals for the IDEA initiative are to better serve our students that have been historically underrepresented in Honors environments, to build a more connected Honors community that promotes greater sense of belonging, and to facilitate the development of **altruistic and empathetic student leaders** that are going to change the world for the better.

With this initiative comes many new developments for our program, starting with HON101. Two new instructors for HON101 have been hired for Fall 2020, the selection process, training, and expectations for Honors TAs have been **revamped**, and an extended mentoring system has been created, all in alignment with the ideals of the IDEA initiative and student as well as campus feedback. Our assessment of the program will now include specific IDEA self-evaluations, an HON101 evaluation, and additional student opportunities for feedback. Furthermore, we have been connecting more with many of the student services and social justice leaders across campus to receive input for how to build our program and to ensure our program is **interwoven into the fabric of the community** as a bastion of consistent support and success. Lastly, for the time being at least, we have been more intentional about the programming and events we want to offer our students, designing an **inclusivity workshop and identity-centered art showcase** for the past semester that would have certainly been the **bees' knees** if not for the whole pandemic thing. But fret not, there will still be much more to come **#staytuned**

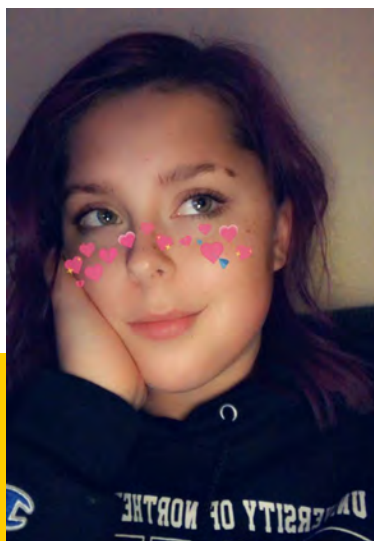

UHP Peer Mentor Program

NCHC Conference, 2019 New Orleans, LA "Disrupting Education"

In November 2019, two honors students traveled to New Orleans to attend the National Colligate Honors Council's annual conference. Both students had been accepted into the competitive student poster competition in their respective categories. Student Honors Council President Grace Davis presented her research on the intersectionality of Queer Christian identity in college students. Malaika Michel-Fuller presented research on the Greeley/Evans community response to the floods of 2013. Director Loree Crow accompanied the students, and also presented in the faculty poster session on a quantitative project analyzing withdraw data from UNC's Honors Program, which was co-authored by past Honors Program Graduate Assistant Sarah Zwetzig. As a surprise, the poster won the faculty poster session. Malaika and Grace came back to UNC and presented their findings about honors students and program and curricular structure to the Student Honors Council and helped to inform the Honors Program current re-visioning process regarding developing a more holistic and inclusive program.

Eugene D. and Peggy J. Koplitz Scholarship

Dr. Koplitz, Professor Emeritus of Educational Psychology, came to UNC in 1958 and studied mental processes of advanced intellects. Because of his experience in gifted education, the task of establishing an Honors program was given to Koplitz. In only a year-and-a half, Koplitz established the UNC Honors Program with partnership in 19 departments on campus as well as establishing the Honors thesis tradition that still stands to this day as one of the more rigorous Honors thesis requirements in the State. As founder of the UNC's Honors Program, Gene Koplitz began a tradition that centered on the intellectual development of many of the University's top students. Throughout his professional career, Dr. Koplitz presented research papers at international, regional, state, and local levels, and he made a large impact on all he met and taught. Sadly, Gene passed away in early September 2017, and is survived by his wife, Peggy, his children David and Stephanie, and five grandchildren.

Becky R. Edgerton Memorial Honors Scholarship

The Honors Program is pleased to recognize the generosity of Ronald K Edgerton who provided the gifts to create the permanent fund to perpetuate excellence in the University Honors Program through the Becky R. Edgerton Memorial Honors Scholarship. Dr. Edgerton was Director of the Honors Program from 1985 to 2000. Becky Edgerton (April 22, 1941-December 17, 1999) loved poetry, opera and good movies; The New York Times Book Review and The New Yorker magazine, good literature, wine and conversation; feminist theory, loyal friends and her family. For her, reading was a way of life, and she read just about everything. She published poetry, taught in the Honors and Life of the Mind programs. We honor Becky Edgerton through the Becky R. Edgerton Memorial Honors Scholarship.



Marie Livingston Honors Scholarship

Dr. Marie Leigh Livingston is Professor Emerita of Economics at University of Northern Colorado. She came to Colorado in 1979 to work for the Economic Research Service, U.S.D.A. and began her career at UNC in 1985 after earning her Ph.D. While at UNC, she was Professor and Chair of Economics, and served as Director of several interdisciplinary programs, including the University Honors Program, International Trade and Relations (now International Affairs) and the Life of the Mind Program. With specializations in water resources and international economics, she worked extensively in Central Europe and has been a visiting professor at University of Minnesota, University of Frankfurt and University of Madrid. In 2009 she was a Fulbright Senior Specialist at the University of Economics in Prague. Since retiring from UNC, her most recent international experience has been to teach at Foreign Trade University in Hanoi, Vietnam.



Gregory E. and Debra K. Holman Scholarship

Greg and Kaye Holman's love of students and belief in the power of education to transform lives strongly guided how they give of their time and talents. As recipients of a variety of grants and scholarships over the course of their academic careers, Greg and Kaye hoped to support other first generation students through the establishment of the Gregory E. and Debra K. Holman Scholarship. In directing their support towards honors and leadership students, the Holmans recognized the students Kaye had worked with in her time at UNC—students like the Holmans themselves, who had a passion and a commitment to academic excellence and the capacity and drive to serve others and the natural world. Currently, Kaye is completing a national fellowship in sustainability in higher education through the Higher Education Associations Sustainability Consortium, and she serves in international sustainability leadership in both ACPA and NASPA.

Barbara Heidger Memorial Scholarship

Barbara Jane Heidger (Hyslop) entered UNC (then Colorado State College) as a member of the newly inaugurated Honors Program, then under the direction of Professor Eugene Koplitz. There she met fellow Honors student Paul Heidger, who she later married. Barbara's academic excellence and devotion to her field (international relations) led her to work abroad with Columbia's Teachers for East Africa during the completion of her Master's coursework. She taught at a residential boy's secondary school in Kericho, Kenya for two years, teaching world history and researching the development of political parties, which had just begun in Kenya in 1964 after emerging from British colonial rule. She continued to be involved with the local and international community, sponsoring the Model UN Program and assuming a leadership position in her church's efforts to welcome and resettle refugee families from Southeast Asia. It is sincerely hoped that this scholarship bearing Barbara's name may assist students at UNC to reach their life goals and full potential. Barbara passed in 1994, and is survived by Paul and their two daughters, Julie and Lisa.



Paul Heidger Scholarship

Paul Heidger '63 was part of the first UNC Honors class of graduates, where he met Barbara. Barbara and Paul married shortly after she returned from Kenya. Until he retired in 2012, Paul taught for 38 years at the University of Iowa, where he was a professor of Anatomy and Cell Biology. After retirement, he continued to work closely with UI students, working as a student adviser for an undergraduate research training program. He led an accomplished path of service and dedication to his profession and his students. Paul eventually remarried, and currently enjoys an expanded family of their shared children and grandchildren.

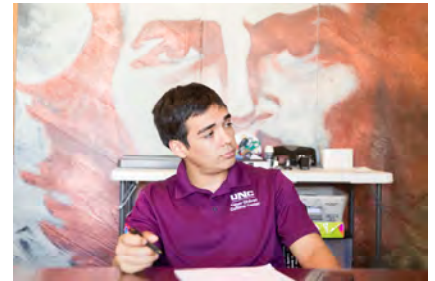

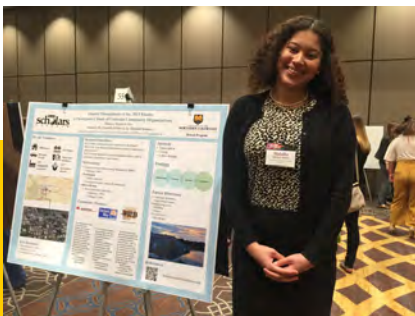

Honors Program Scholarship - Kinzy Burke

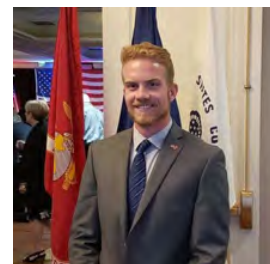

Marie L. Livingston Honors Scholarship – Grace Davis

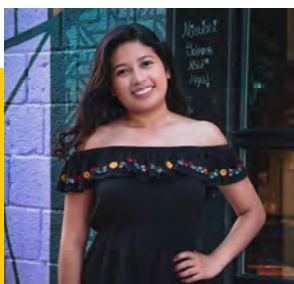
