Course description: This course will look at religion from an anthropological perspective. We will look at how different cultures access meaning through myth, folklore and religion. The course will ask students to think about how looking at religion through this lens differs from a comparative religion or philosophy of religion course. At the end of the course, students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate a working understanding of the world's current major religions.

- 2. Look at the function that religion and spirituality play in different societies.
- 3. Understand the integration of geography and power in how religions are constructed.
- 4. Investigate their own relationship to religion in a cultural framework.
- 5. Know in depth a specific world region and the belief systems of that area.

Policies:

The class moves at a fast pace, so please make sure to check in on Blackboard regularly. Announcements and readings will rely on you checking in on BB.

Plagiarism will not be tolerated. In brief know that if the words you write did not come from your own thoughts, you must cite where they are from. If the idea is not uniquely your own, you must cite where you got it. Plagiarism will result in either failing the course or receiving a grade of 0 for that assignment.

Emails must be sent via UNC email addresses and you must include "ANT 333" in the subject line.

Homework:

You will keep a journal of reflections and minor assignments as assigned in class. Your journal will also contain dated class notes from every day we meet. These entries will serve to create attendance points in addition to being a requirement for the journal entries.

You will also have a final paper that will follow the rubric below.

20%=Clarity-I should not have to read and reread your paper in order to understand your work. Your work should clearly direct the reader to the main points and then develop them accordingly.

20%=Content-Your work should reflect an understanding of the topic, and contribute your own ideas that reflect synthesis of the material and critical thinking. You should have something to say, and cite ALL parts of your paper that are not your own original thoughts. Your citations should reflect independent pursuit of scholarly works related to your topic. Please utilize MLA for all citations.

20%=Concise-Write your papers free of unnecessary repetition. This doesn't mean you won't restate certain parts, but it does mean that each paragraph contributes new information, with the exception of the conclusion. Your conclusion will not just restate your thesis and main points, but will tie them together to form a conclusive statement, but remember not to introduce new information into your conclusion.

20%=Presentation-Your work should be presented will, according to the guidelines we will discuss in class. Your writing should be free of mechanical errors, and any other writing flaws that detract from your work.

20%=Interesting, engaging and insightful-Your paper should be interesting to read, and keep the attention of your reader, as well as having something worthwhile to say that is beyond mere repetition and discussions assigned.

Group Project: Students will be assigned a group and will be given guidelines to a group project that will be presented in class. Attendance for all group presentations is mandatory

and there will be no excused absences outside of UNC sanctioned (required) obligations, a verifiable medical emergency as approved by the instructor, jury duty, court subpoena, or military duty. These presentations will take place the last part of the semester after spring break.

There will be a final exam in class. Please bring a bluebook.
