
When people look at maps of UNC, one of the things that stands out is how many buildings we have reserved as places students can go for help.

Resource Centers



There are numerous resource centers across campus, but here are some that many first-year students visit.

Writing Center:

Located in Ross Hall, the Writing Center helps students with essays, clinical reports, writing assignments, scholarship essays, and so much more. For more information, click here.

Disability Support Services:

Located in Michener, DSS offers accommodations to students that include, but are not limited to, sign language interpreting, adaptive technology, note-taking, and testing accommodations. To learn more, click here.
