

UNIT DESCRIPTION:

The Center for Career Readiness serves all UNC students and recent alumni. We work with students and recent alumni one-on-one or within groups to:

- Identify personal qualities (personal values, interest, strength, skill, preferences, ability or identity) related to choosing a career goal
- Utilize career information to inform their goals
- Draft meaningful career goals
- Find ways they can participate in experiences to gain career readiness skills
- Apply career skills (resume and cover letter writing, interviewing, negotiation, job searching, networking and writing personal statements) to pursue opportunities

The Center for Career Readiness organizes all UNC's major Job, Internship and Graduate School Fairs and K-12 Employment Fairs. Additionally, we provide campus-wide access to Handshake, a job searching platform for students to find on and off campus part-time and work study employment, internships, and full-time employment.

UNIT HIGHLIGHTS:

The Center for Career Readiness hosts one Job, Internship and Graduate Fair and one K-12 Employment Fair each semester. The Center for Career Readiness hosts on-campus interviews where employers and students meet and interview. We collaborate with Alumni Relations to: offer career programming to alumni more than 3 years out, connect current students with UNC alumni mentors, and identify alumni who would like to hire our students.

FACULTY SUPPORT:

UNC faculty can request career related presentations for their class. Our Career Counselors are happy to come into classes and present on an array of career related topics. UNIT DESCRIPTION:

Academic Bridge (AB) offers students extra support and encouragement as they make their transition from high school to college life. AB works specifically with Denver Scholarship Foundation scholars (who are not admitted into the TRIO/SSS program) and Independent students. AB provides support, advising, study strategies, and overall transitioning from high school to college.

The TRIO/SSS program provides participants with the care, encouragement, and support they need to be successful at UNC. Each year the TRIO/SSS program accepts approximately 70 new participants into the program. To be eligible, students must identify as first-generation. The focus of SSS is on facilitating the successful academic retention and graduation of program participants.

UNIT HIGHLIGHTS:

- TRIO/Student Support Services recognized for Outstanding Achievement in Sponsored Programs for Academic year 17-18.
- TRIO/Student Support Services program exceeded grant objectives by double digits in AY 17-18: 95% persistence rate, 96% of students in good academic standing, 65% of 2012 cohort graduated within 6 years.

FACULTY SUPPORT:

Faculty can support TRIO/SSS and Academic Bridge participants by creating a welcoming, safe, and supportive learning environment for all first-generation college students attending UNC. Faculty can also refer students who identify as first-generation to CHE programs for academic, personal, and career support.

UNIT DESCRIPTION:

The Dean of Students Office oversees the Disability Resource Center, Community Standards and Conflict Resolution, Center for Career Readiness, Counseling Center, and Student Life. Included in the work are CARE Team (threat assessment), Student Outreach and Support, Assault Survivors Advocacy Program, student clubs and organizations, Student Senate, Fraternities & Sororities, Prevention Education, and Catalyst - UNC’s annual social justice training retreat. The DOS contributes to an enlivening university community by focusing on student development, empowerment, accountability, and success.

We assist faculty with conflict resolution and problematic student conduct in the classroom (also known as classroom disruption). We consult with faculty on difficult student issues, such as cases involving harm to self or others. When requested, we advise faculty on cases of academic misconduct. We provide faculty with advisement on student disability accommodations. We help faculty with internship arrangements and post-graduation employment for their majors/degree programs. We offer direct support by providing counseling services to faculty through the Employee Assistance Program.

UNIT DESCRIPTION:

UNC offers a two-tier Honors Program for students with a desire to explore their academic studies more deeply. The lower division, Honors Interdisciplinary Program, is designed for students to begin while in their freshmen or sophomore year. Students complete either the Life of the Mind option or the self-designed theme option.

The Upper Division Honors Program is designed for students who are entering into their junior year, although may be started in the senior year as long as all of the credit hours can still be completed in time for graduation. Upper Division Honors students choose one of three curricular paths: 1) Research 2) Creative or 3) Applied in which they will complete an Honors Thesis or Capstone, with faculty mentoring.

UNIT HIGHLIGHTS:

UNC's Research Day is coordinated by the Honors Program. Research Day showcases undergraduate and graduate research, scholarly and creative works projects from all disciplines. Honors Research Night is held every semester providing senior Honors students an opportunity to present their Honors theses. Honors students may also submit to present at the National Honors conference. Every year one or two students are usually selected to present at the National Conference. Honors students may submit creative works for publication in Scribendi, a Regional Honors Publication. UNC has had students selected into Scribendi the past two years.

FACULTY SUPPORT:

- The Honors Program hosts a faculty luncheon each semester for current honors advisors to meet new faculty who are interested in learning more about the Honors program.
- The Honors Program publishes the Honors Faculty Handbook each semester which provides guidelines for honors thesis and capstone advisors.
- The Honors Program Director meets individually with all new Honors Departmental Liaisons each semester. Honors Departmental Liaisons are available to provide support for new faculty in their department who are interested in mentoring student thesis work.

UNIT DESCRIPTION:

The McNair Scholars Program is a federal TRIO program that provides high-potential undergraduate students with effective preparation for doctoral-level study. McNair participants are either first-generation college students with financial need or members of other groups traditionally underrepresented in graduate education. The program aims to transform students into scholars through a holistic approach that includes engagement in research and scholarly activities, opportunities for personal and professional development, guidance from exemplary faculty, and assistance with the graduate school admissions process.

UNIT HIGHLIGHTS:

- 100% of graduates in Spring 2019 accepted into graduate programs
- Approximately 75% of Scholars enroll in graduate school immediately
- Program applications available in January and due on March 1
- Always seeking faculty to participate on panels, review proposals, serve on advisory board

UNIT DESCRIPTION:

The Office of Financial Aid connects students and their family to financial solutions such as grants, scholarships, student employment and loans to help them bridge the gap between what they can afford to pay for their college expenses and the cost of attending.

UNIT HIGHLIGHTS:

- The Office of Financial Aid has processed more than \$150,574,112 in aid from all sources for 18-19 academic year.
- More than 3,115 UNC undergraduates received a Federal Pell Grant for 2018 which means ~ one in three UNC undergraduate students are considered very needy students.
- Will ask for campus support each fall in promoting awareness for early FAFSA completion.
- Data indicates the number one factor in determining if a student will attend UNC is the completion of a FAFSA with UNC listed as a school to receive.
- May ask for help in documenting course engagement for federal aid purposes.

FACULTY SUPPORT:

- Employee and Dependent tuition grants are handled through the Office of Financial Aid in cooperation with Human Resources.
- Faculty and staff who are aware of a student struggling with finances are always welcome to reach out to Financial Aid for any possible interventions or solutions.
- Student work study and student hourly workers are coordinated through the Student Employment Office within the Office of Financial Aid in cooperation with The Center for Career Readiness and Payroll.

UNIT DESCRIPTION:

Research in Higher Education identifies that student persistence and retention rates are positively influenced by the level and quality of their interactions with peers as well as active participation in student organizations and campus life. SOAR provides proactive academic coaching to students in the Bears First program as well as provide individualized academic advising to exploring students and students considering a major change. SOAR will provide students with academic and personal support in an inclusive environment by teaching them the skills necessary to make self-motivated and informed academic decisions.

Faculty are welcome to contact us with questions for exploring students or students participating in the Bears First program. The only way a faculty member will know if a student is part of the Bears First program is if the student self-discloses they are part of Bears First to the faculty member. It is not something that faculty should ask students randomly, as students will already know if they are part of our program. Faculty can also refer students to our office for major conversations if a student is wanting to drop out of that faculty's program but doesn't know what they want to switch their major to.

OIEC works with other offices on campus to provide training and information to students, faculty, and staff about UNC policy, procedures, and issues of healthy relationships and consent. OIEC also receives and investigates complaints of harassment, discrimination, and sexual misconduct.

- Improved processes and communication regarding investigations and processes leading to an 11.4% decrease in the average time needed to close a case in the last year.
- Trained numerous faculty and staff departments about UNC policies, procedures, and reporting requirements, leading to a steady increase in reporting of concerns and support being provided to students.

Our mission is to foster intellectual discovery and empower a diverse community of learners and researchers through collections, education, outreach, services, and learning spaces.

UNIT HIGHLIGHTS:

Opening in 1971, the James A. Michener Library, contains over 1.3 million physical items (books, government publications, DVDs, etc.) and offers 24/7 online access to 200+ databases, 86,000 full text journals, and over 433,000 e-books. University Libraries is also an active member of Prospector, the state-wide lending program. The building is open 97 hours per week and offers a late night study space until 2am five nights a week. Michener Library is home to the University Archives and Special Collections, including the James Michener Collection, the Connie Willis Collection, and the Petteys Collection of Women Artists. The Mari Michener Gallery hosts numerous exhibits by locally and nationally known artists as well as work by UNC alumni, faculty, staff, and students.

Built in 1997, the Howard M. Skinner Music Library hold more than 150,000 music-related scores, books, periodicals, and recordings. Online music services, offering over a million songs in a wide variety of genres, are available through the University Libraries website. The music library also supports curricular needs by providing classroom space, computers, audio-visual equipment, and study space.

FACULTY SUPPORT:

University Libraries supports faculty's curricular and research needs by providing services including library instruction, online tutorials that can integrate into Canvas, course reserves, and an institutional repository. The Libraries also welcomes suggestions for materials, both print and electronic. FACULTY SUPPORT:



UNC Athletics sponsors 19 varsity sports, competing as a NCAA Division I program, with FCS football. The majority of sports (men's and women's basketball, football, men's and women's golf, women's soccer, softball, men's & women's tennis, men's and women's cross country, indoor & outdoor track, volleyball) compete in the Big Sky Conference. UNC also competes in the Western Athletic Conference (swimming & Diving, baseball) and the Big 12 (wrestling).

UNIT HIGHLIGHTS:

- UNC student-athletes have posted a collective 3.0 or better GPA in 15 consecutive semesters.
- Three Bears were named to their respective Google Cloud CoSIDA Academic All-District teams: Brittany Lawrence (volleyball), Rico Montoya (wrestling) and Luke Nelson (football). Lawrence and Montoya each earned All-American honors.
- Rico Montoya (wrestling) was the Big 12 Scholar Athlete of the Year.
